He had secured, up to date, 150,000 chinook eggs, and said there was plenty of fish at the rack and more coming all the time. A big freshet is the only thing that will prevent him getting all the eggs he can handle.

(Bandon Recorder.) The long dearth of schooners was broken last Monday by the arrival of the schooner Del Norte which made its appearance here from Rogue river and sailed in over the bar.

The cannery was obliged to shut down for a few days awaiting a supply of tin from the city. A supply came on the Mandalay, and Tuesday morning the cannery began taking fish again.

T. W. Clark, of the Bandon Woolen Mills Co., struck out Tuesday for the Willamette valley, to secure night weavers. He went to Myrtle Point in a buggy from which place he went by stage. He will visit Oregon City and other valley towns.

Captain C. H. Butler took the tug out over the bar Tuesday giving the bar a good inspection. He reported two channels each having a depth of eleven feet of water. The worst trouble is that each channel is narrow, the one north being crooked, while the one to the south is dangerously close to the south jetty. However the two channels are not likely to keep apart for any length of time.

Fourteen hundred salmon were received at the Marshfield cannery Monday.
