Oregon's Fruit Exhibit at Buffalo.

Oregon's great fruit exhibit at the Pan-American Exposition, was altogether the best in variety of product and general excellence and attractiveness to be seen at Buffalo. It was awarded the Wilder medal by the Pomological Association of America. In all, the exhibit was awarded by the exposition fourteen gold medals, fifteen silver medals and forty-five bronze medals and fourteen honorable mentions. The following are excerpts from a write-up in the Buffalo Review:
"From a standpoint of merit, the collective exhibits from the state of Oregon equal any that were made, and surpass the majority. From no single state has there come such a variety. The wealth of the mines the product of the field and forest and the industrial products of the state were all shown in profusion. Public opinion concerning the state where rolls the Oregon has been well molded by the various exhibits made at the Pan-American.

"Not the least interesting were the wonderful exhibits of fruit. Apples, pears, grapes, apricots, prunes and all the smaller fruits were shown in such quality as to put the state foremost in the ranks of the fruit-growing states of the Union. Of the apples, the Kings, Alexander, Wolf River Baldwins, Spitznbergers, Yellow Newton Pippin, Red-Cheeked Pippin, Oregon Red, Jonathan, Kay, Romanite, Northern Spy, Arkansas Black, Black Twig, Glori Mundi, the Ben Davis and Gano, predominate.

"Of pears, the varieties, Idaho, Beurre de Chaireau, Doyenne de Comice, Beurre de Anjon, Louise Bonne de Jersey, Fall Butter, Kieffer, Pound Pear, Bartlett, Sickle and Winter Nellies are the more common. There are, however, some 12 or 15 other varieties of pears, some of which are totally unknown in this country.

"The display of grapes includes Niagaras, Concord, Wordens, Sweetwaters, Delawares and Malagas. Quinces twice the size of the two firsts are common, and are of very fine quality, despite their size, which is very unusual. Small fruit, such as currants, peaches, prunes and apricots are shown in the preserved state.

"The greater part of the fine fruit came from the Hood River valley section of the state, a section noted for the production of fine fruits. To this section, however, the Willamette Valley section is a close second when it comes to fruit-growing, and a great many of the finest apples and pears are from the latter section. Some of the finest fruits in the exhibit was sent by E. L. Smith, president of the State Board of Horticulture.

"Colonel Dosch, as superintendent of the Oregon exhibits, Mrs. Edyth Tozier Weathered, commissioner, and Mr. George Sloeman, in charge of the horticulture exhibit, have been thoroughly competent representatives of the Pacific coast. These have made numbers of friends, who will regret their leavetaking.
