President Favors Exclusion Law.

Washington, Nov. 20.—In his message to Congress the President will not only recommend the re-enactment of the Chinese exclusion act, but will go further and recommend that it be strengthened to increase its efficiency. The President gave out this information today to Representative Needham, of California.

The President told other Western callers today that he would call the attention of Congress in his message to the advisability of doing something to reclaim the great arid regions of the West.

Van Jant Asks for Aid.

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 20.—The following statement was given out from Governor Van Jant's office today:

"Owing to the great interest of the West and the great desire to see the attempt to consolidate the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railway lines resisted, Governors of the states having anti-consolidation laws similar to those of Minnesota, to join in an effort to fight the great railway trust."

Glafe Company, of Porthard are packing apples in fifty pound boxes to be shipped to Vladivostok, Siberia. The apples are shipped on an oriental liner to Japan and there are re-shipped to the Russian port. Each apple is wrapped with a piece of absorbent paper, made especially for fruit packing. Nothing but perfect fruit is taken. A slight bruise or worm hole is sufficient to cause rejection. The apples at Vladivostok will probably stand the consumer \$3 to \$3.50 a box.
