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Terms Outlined for the Boers.

London, November 29.—In the course of an important speech at Croydon last night the Right Hon. C. T. Ritchie, Secretary of State for Home Affairs, declared that Premier Salisbury's statement "that no shred of independence should be left to the republics" had been twisted and contorted in a way Lord Salisbury never intended. "It was not intended," he said, "that the Boers should not have a representative in the Government or that we insisted upon unconditional surrender except in the sense that we could not again offer the terms which had been rejected. If any General representing the Boers in arms has made a proposition of peace on the conditions that the Boers should, in the course of time, have a representative in the Government, I am satisfied such a proposition will be referred home by Lord Kitchener and will form a basis for conclusion of peace.

"We desired a termination of hostilities, so that Boer and Briton could live together in peace and the same extraordinary success which has attended the British administration of Egypt would be repeated in South Africa, if the Boers would only frankly acknowledge their defeat and ask for terms."—Examiner.

**Chinamen Kill Four.**

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—Two Chinese are dead and two others, mortally wounded, lie at the receiving hospital as the result of two murderous attacks in Chinatown. Both shootings were the culmination of a long-standing feud between rival highbinders associations. The men who were killed outright were shot as they lay sleeping in a bunk at 902 Clay street. Their names are Quan Lucy and Sney Duck. Loue Fook, better known as Little Loue, and Jue Do are the other victims.

Fook was shot four times as he was entering his gambling joint at 102 Waverly Place, accompanied by Do, who was his bodyguard, as Little Loue fell mortally wounded. Do drew his revolver, but before he could use it he received a bullet in his neck.

Shortly after the shooting, the police arrested a notorious high-binder, who gave his name as Lee You, on suspicion of having wounded both men. When searched a revolver which had been recently fired was found on him. About 15 minutes after the perpetration of this crime another shooting occurred in a lodging house at 902 Clay street. Sergeant Donovan and Officers Tilman and McNamara ran to the place, and going upstairs, they found Quan Lucy and Sney Duck, dead. Both had been shot while they slept on a bunk in a small room on the second floor.

After the shooting, a large squad of police was sent into Chinatown, and in a short time the officers arrested half a dozen highbinders, who were heavily armed and bent on avenging the murder of Little Loue.—Evening Telegram.

**Plan to Build Railway From Paris to New York.**

New York, Nov. 29.—Harry De Windt, writing for the Royal Geographical Society, has addressed to the Globe a letter on the proposed railway from Paris to New York, says the Tribune's London representative. He points out that the project is not a new one. The Russian authorities have been considering it for more than a year past, and he himself is proceeding next month with the expedition Paris to New York by land to ascertain whether the plan is a feasible one. He says the crossing of Bering Strait presents no greater difficulties than the tunneling of the Straits of Dover.

Recent talk of men of influence has had a tendency to give a black eye to the idea that congress would dicker with the French Panama Canal Company and added to the probability of the choice of the Nicaragua route for the Isthmian Canal. This is accord with public sentiment.

**IN A BOSTON SANITARIUM WITH HIS MIND SHATTERED.**

Elijah Smith, Formerly an Oregon Millionaire, is Broken in Purse and Health—Once Prominent as Hill.

New York, Nov. 29.—(Special to the Evening Telegram.)—Elijah Smith, of Oregon, once a power in railroad affairs and a millionaire, now broken in purse and with his mind shattered, is an inmate of a sanitarium in Boston, and is being cared for by his brother, Prosper W. Smith. He was known in Wall street as Elijah the Prophet, and was as prominent as J. P. Morgan, J. J. Hill, or James R. Keen are now. His brother thinks he may recover.

**Railway Combine Ready for Fight.**

New York, Nov. 29.—The Evening Post prints the following today. Jacob H. Schiff has resigned as a director of the Great Northern Railway. This is the first of the resignations of directors a holding seats in two or more of the Northwestern railroad directorates to be had announced, and it is believed it is to be followed by still others. It was reported in Wall street that Mr. Schiff had resigned as a director of the Northern Securities Company, but this is not true. The report probably arose from the Great Northern Railway board, which was not generally known in Wall street today.

**Men Fell 700 Feet and Lived.**

Connellsville, Pa., Nov. 29.—At the Lambert mines near Massontown eight men, after dropping 700 feet down the mine shaft, were all brought to the surface living, but with three dying and the others probably fatally hurt. Just as they got aboard the cage, the cable parted and the cage dropped. The cage on the opposite side was immediately loaded with a rescue party, who found the men lying unconscious on the floor of the cage, with crushed chests, broken arms and legs, and in some cases the bones protruding out through the flesh. One man's skull was fractured.
