Mr. Elliott is constructing a "working" model at present, and they have hopes in the near future to have one of the machines installed and working. While the sawing is all done with small circulars which reduces the necessary driving force materially and is a great saving of timber, being thin and cutting away much less into dust, yet it is so constructed as to saw the largest logs, in fact, the larger the better. We congratulate Mr. Dyer on his invention and wish him the success he deserves.
