Hand Separators.

The subject of hand separators, formed the text of an interesting address delivered at a recent meeting of the Canadian Dairywomen's Association by Professor H. H. Dean, one of the officials of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph.

A second advantage is that it enables the private dairyman to get more of this better class of cream, and thus make more and better butter.

We pasteurized all the whole milk before putting it through the separator-i. e., we heated the milk to temperatures from 160 to 200 degrees, and after the skim milk came through the separator, we ran directly over a Lister cooler, connected with our waterworks, and cooled it to 60 degrees.

A great many who use hand separators take the warm cream from the separator and put it in with the cream that has been skimmed in the morning or the previous day.

These two great evils to guard against in the use of the hand separator. If these two points are carefully observed, we shall have a better quality of cream, but not otherwise.—Hoard's Dairyman.

Marvelous Capabilities of the New Holland Submarine Torpedo Boat.

The following from Rear Admiral Lowe, retired, appeared in a special to the Examiner: New York, Nov. 24.—We went down at 7:30, and after adjusting the vessel so as to have an easy berth on the bottom, a watch of two men was set and all the others proceeded to occupy themselves in various ways.

We observed during the night that the vessel, resting upon her bilge upon the bottom, lowered a trifle and buried herself into the mud, saying, perhaps, one foot. From this we argued that it was blowing, which, however, was the only indication that there was any weather at all.

At ten o'clock, the time having elapsed, and for no other reason, the vessel was brought to the surface, when we found that a severe gale was blowing, of which below we had no knowledge.

It was an experiment in which I consider myself privileged to have partaken it was marvelous. I believe we could stay down for six months—leastways in definitely. It is only a matter of mathematical calculations as to food, fuel and air supply.

Should one of these destroyers expend all her torpedoes and fail to sink a ship or a fleet, she can drop to the bottom and remain there for days, if necessary.

AMERICAN TERRITORY. Cannot Impose Duty on Imports from the Philippines.

Washington, Dec. 2.—The United States Supreme Court today rendered a decision in the case of Emil J. Pepke vs. the United States. This is the case known as the "Fourteen Diamond Rings" case, involves the constitutionality of the imposition of customs duties upon merchandise brought into the United States from the Philippine Islands after the exchange of the peace treaty with Spain.
