What a New Arrival Says of Us.

As there has been several asked me what I thought of Oregon I will give the readers of the HERALD an idea of what I think of this section of the web foot country. I like the country fine at least what I have seen of it, and also the climate is much better than I expected to find. I was informed before I came here that it rained all the time for six months. Although it rains a great deal, there has not been any cold rains as any one would expect to see in the winter in any country. A little frost but not enough to speak of for winter.

I am afraid to write back to Montana that there was strawberries on the vines when I came here two weeks ago and some in bloom and plenty of apples on the trees. If I did they would say, well, he is improving some in his old habit, and to tell them that a fifteen pound fish could be bought for 25 cents they would say well, he is a fit subject for the asylum. In Montana we pay 25 cents per pound for the same kind of fish that is at our butcher shops.

I have been asked what kind of a time we had coming out here. It was all right to Portland and on the river it was nice but from the time we struck the bar until we got to Coos bay traveling lost all its charms, for we were sick, could not eat, could not sleep, and scared half to death. I would rather ride any bronco I ever saw then to get on salt water again. I promised myself if I ever got off that ship and any body ever heard of me being on salt water again they can say there is something wrong with my head. I will take my chances on terra firma I was never so tickled in my life to see any place as I was to see Coos bay.

I like the people fine for the short time I have been here. They are very friendly and all seem to agree very well and as I have said several times I never saw as many hale, hearty looking old men any where as I have here. They are as spry as young men in some countries. I will bring this to a close and wait until I get better acquainted for I might change my mind in some respects, but there is one thing I don't think there is any danger of a change of mind about and that is getting out on salt water again.
