OF NATIONAL INTEREST.

Congress is going to provide for the construction of the Isthmian canal this session. That is as good as settled. President Roosevelt—it comes hard for his admirers to be so dignified—and some of those who knew and loved him best before September last, had compromised on "President Teddy" the President delivered his dictum on that in his message with no uncertain sound. It will be the Nicaragua route, too, for reasons that have been threshed over and over again and need not be repeated here.

The Frenchmen who have sunk their millions in the De-Lesseps ditch at Panama are never going to get it back again by selling a lot of rusty machinery and a stupendous excavation in a mountain side to the United States. However, they still think so. Like some people who think they can play poker, but who never win anything, they are hanging on by their eyelids to a forlorn hope.

President Hutin, of the Panama Canal Company, accompanied by Chancellor Bouffie, of the French Embassy, who has been acting as his legal adviser during the negotiations with the Isthmian Canal Commission has sailed for France to report to the stockholders that things are looking very equally, and the only chance left to them is to buy a majority of the American Congress.

Hutin will be back in January, so he told Secretary Hay before he left Washington, and rumor has it that the size of his sack will be something enormous. The palms of the lobbyists are already itching at the thought of all this French gold to be handled, and these palms are well waxed. The Congressional lobbyists are the bonecutters of the nation. Their victims are the men who try to buy legislation with treasury notes. The Frenchman will have no difficulty in parting with his money. When the Nicaragua Canal bill is passed he will realize the truth of that ancient adage, "a fool and his money are soon parted."

Mr. Justice Brown is the man who in each case that has come before the Court, has wielded the balance of power. On the one side are ranged Chief Justice Fuller, and Justices Brewer, Harlan and Peckham. On the other side are Justices Gray, McKenna, Stribos and White. Justice Brown stands at the center of the letter-board, and in one case flops with the Chief Justice and in the other with the dissenters.

Equally noteworthy, however were the announcements from the white house, which immediately preceded the message. The removal from office of the Governor of Oklahoma is a warning to all corrupt politicians, as well as to those who, without intending to be corrupt, might have thought it no sin to reward friends and workers at the expense of the people whose affairs they have been chosen to administer.

We were not surprised to read that King Edward greatly enjoyed a series of vaudeville performances at the royal residence. It is natural that he should. He was a star vaudeville performer himself long before the term came into general use, as some of his imitators on this side of the Atlantic were, although never a professional.

According to the bare majority of the Court the Philippine Islands are domestic territory of the United States, and have been ever since Spain signed the treaty of peace, in which that vast archipelago and the little but valuable island of Porto Rico were ceded to the Republic.

President Roosevelt's message was remarkably characteristic of the man. It carried small comfort to the office seekers and gave our foreign friends and foes much to think about and talk over.

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Death of Mrs. Phoebe Day.

At her home in Roseburg, Saturday, December 21, 1901, at 10 p. m., Mrs. Phoebe Day passed to the great beyond, at the age of 74 years. She was a daughter of the late Sol Fitzhugh, one of the framers of the constitution for the state of Oregon and crossed the plains to this state in the year 1852. The party with whom she came experienced many hardships and on one occasion they suffered the loss of nearly everything they had, from an Indian attack, only managing to make good their escape by retreating to the timber, where they buried what few things they had left in a wooden chest. This chest is still cherished by her descendants as an interesting and valued relic. She had been gradually failing in health for about three months, and her death was momentarily expected during the past few days. One son, Sol Culver, of Camas Valley, a number of grandchildren and two great grandchildren survive her. Her remains were taken to Camas Valley early this morning and will be laid to rest there by the side of her husband, who died about eleven years ago. A countless number of friends and acquaintances will mourn the loss of Mrs. Day and cherish her memory and high character along with the other pioneer women of Oregon, who have gone to final reward.

The foregoing we take from the Roseburg Review. The subject of this sketch was well known in this section, being an aunt of Mrs. C. W. Benham, of this city.

One Dead and Nine Hurt.
San Francisco, Dec. 24.—One person was killed and nine others injured in a peculiar accident on the Fillmore-street electric car line last night. For four blocks south of Union street the grade is so steep that the cars have to be pulled up the hill by special machinery. As a car containing 15 people had nearly reached the top of the hill it broke loose in some manner and rushed down the grade with frightful speed. It kept the track until Union street was reached. Here there stood an empty car, waiting to be hauled to the summit. This obstruction was crashed into and wrecked by the runaway car, which then jumped the rails and was brought to a standstill by a telegraph pole which it struck, scattering its occupants in all directions.

Help was at hand and the injured passengers were given immediate care.

Socialists Effect Party Organization.
Oregon City, Or., Dec. 21.—Fifty Clackamas County Socialists met this afternoon and effected a permanent party organization by electing a county central committee. Fred Meindl was elected chairman and William Beard secretary. Twelve precincts were represented. The members signed a pledge to sever their connection with other political parties. They also voted against fusion.
