Election Laws out.

Salem, Dec. 21.—In compliance with the requirements of law, Secretary of State Dunbar has printed in pamphlet form all the election laws of this state. Each succeeding session of the Legislature makes some changes in the election laws, and, as a consequence, the pamphlet containing the laws increases in size every two years.

The pamphlet just issued is an improvement over those which have been issued heretofore, so far as arrangement is concerned. Instead of topical titles printed in small type in the margin, the different subjects are given in heavy type above each section, making it easier to find any provision of the laws. A complete index is appended to the election laws.
