(From the Coos Bay News) Manger Chandler has purchased the plant of the Beaverton mine, formerly operated by R. A. Graham, and will use it at Beaver Hill.

G. A. Brown, who is in charge of the South Coos river hatchery, lately turned 250,000 chinook fry loose to shift for themselves. He has over 2,500,000 salmon eggs yet on hand, but no provision has been made for keeping the young fish for any length of time, and consequently he will be obliged to let them go while they are so small as to fall easy prey to trout, fish ducks, etc. It is too bad that the necessary funds are not available. It would mean a big increase in the run of fish on the bay a few years from now.

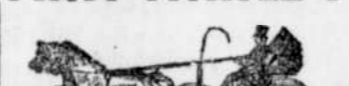
