At a special meeting held this, 22nd day of January, 1902, the Common Council adopted the following resolution: WHEREAS, the infection of small-pox is being spread through the city by careless persons exposed thereto, and

Peach Growing in Georgia

Ten years ago, says the Atlanta Journal, the hills and table lands now covered with orchards of luscious Elberta and other peaches were uncultivated. Few farmers took the trouble to clear the rocky ledges, and the land could be bought for \$1 to \$5 an acre. Now, unimproved woodland sells for \$20 to \$25 an acre, and cleared land for \$50 and upward. Orchards already in bearing can scarcely be bought at reasonable prices.
