## Is Advertising Improper?

Dr. William A. Wise, one of the most prominent dentists of Portland, and member of the State Board of Medical Examiners, has withdrawn his membership in the Oregon State Dental Society for the reason that members of that society are not permitted to advertise their business by the ethics of that society. Among other things he says:

"I have swung clear of the society," said Dr. Wise today, "because its rules hamper my progress. The society does not permit its members to advertise. I have determined to advertise. I have been held back long enough by the hypocrisy of ethics, which is purely and simply a scheme to make a corporation of dentists and keep the young dentists from becoming kings."

"If I can spend \$1000 in advertising and get 10,000 worth of business in return I am a fool if I don't advertise. And if I make a profit of only 1000, I have made a good investment."

"It seems to me that a dentist who is content to hide himself in a little back office and work for barely bread and butter for years just because he is afraid to break bonds of alleged ethical propriety, and let the people know he is alive, standing in his own light."

"Oh, you wouldn't place yourself on a plane with merchants who trust themselves and wares before the public, would you? say those ethical dentists. You don't want to do dental work for everybody in Portland?"

"I am willing and ready to do work for all the people who will come," I answer. That is what I am a dentist for."

I wish to emphasize the fact that merchants of Portland who are progressive and advance, and carry out what they advertise to do, are far ahead of these little ethical dentists who profess to look down on them. These merchants are men of brains; they are citizens, pay their taxes and are a power in the community, while these ethical dentists who are too stung to pay the bills that advertising would cost, but are always ready to take advantage of every little chance to get their names in print when it does not cost any thing, are no-ways as compared with the merchants."

"To me it seems more honorable to advertise openly and carry out what is advertised than to be always on the look out to take advantage of every circumstance that permits free advertising, and at the same time 'kneecap' a fellow dentist who has the nerve to pay for his advertising."

"All the large mercantile firms of Portland who are large advertisers carry out what they promise. When you see a certain article of known standard advertised to sell at a certain price, if these stores you can go and get it just as advertised."

"That is my own view of advertising. I have no sympathy with a doctor or dentist or merchant who advertises to do something that he cannot or does not do, but where it is carried on honestly advertising is as legitimate in dentistry as in any other business."

"The 'Miller' system of signaling is receiving serious consideration by the officials of several of the greater railroad systems. It is claimed that, by the use of the Miller system, collisions, the head end or rear end, will be practically impossible. The system has been given very exhaustive tests on the Chicago and Eastern Illinois Railroad, and it was patented last February."

By utilizing the rails as conductors of an electric current and by means of electric batteries, a white electric lamp is kept burning in the engine at all times when the road is clear for at least half a mile ahead. If the track is not clear the white light is automatically extinguished and a red light shows in its stead. A red light will show in case of any derangement of the track, such as broken rail, submerged track, open drawbridge, bridge out, train ahead open switch, etc. etc.

The Rustic was a four-page paper, size of page 8x11 inches. Among the advertisements were the professional cards of Dr. Tower; Dr. O. E. Smith, dentist; D. L. Watson, attorney, and Skinner & Winchester, attorneys. Advertisements were those of F. Schetter, agents for the Coal Bank store, Eastport; H. P. Whitney, proprietor of the Empire Market, with a note stating that Eugene O'Connell is our authorized agent at all points above Empire City; Jay Tuttle & Co., Empire City drug store; H. H. Lucas, general merchandise, Empire; A. Nasburg, general merchandise, Marshfield. We notice in the marine report that the steamer Coquille, barkentine Melanethon, Webfoot and Orient, bars Cambridge and Clar Sutel, and schooners Gotama, Norway, Parrel, Elida and Jennie Thelin had arrived, and the schooners Ivanhoe and Vanderbilt had sailed. Wm. Hall and George Dyer, democratic candidates for joint senator at joint representative, were to address the citizens of Coos and Curry counties at stated times and places, and D. L. ## Train Ditched by Snow.

Kansas City, Jan. 27.—Last night and today was the coldest experience in this part of the Southwest this winter, with the following temperatures reported: Clinton, Mo., 17 degrees below zero; Lawrence, Kan., 16 below; Abilene, Kan., 15 below; Kansas City, 7 below. At Clinton, Mo., the thermometer fell 19 degrees within 12 hours. Near Jewell, Kan., a Missouri Pacific train was ditched today by running into a snowbank. No one but the engineer was injured. The indications are that the severe cold is at an end.

They not only use the spray pump, but they value it too highly that they are spending money freely for the latest improved pumps and engines for running them, with the result that they are saving from 95 to 98 percent of their apples from the ravages of the codlin moth, while their neighbors from the fence who do not spray save less than 50 per cent. A careful estimate places the added cost of a box of apples when sprayed at about 2 cents. Think of that, when compared with the added value! In a season of average yield, a box of wormy apples has no value whatever, and at any time is liable to be condemned and destroyed. Only a few weeks ago a buyer from France was in Oregon. He had seen our apples at Buffalo and wanted 10 carloads, for which he was ready to pay \$2 per box. We need not worry about the market here as much as over the methods to be pursued in the production of first-class fruit."

## MINES OF DOUGLAS.

Outlook is Flattering at Myrtle Creek and Glendale.

B. M. Armitage reports increasing activity in the Myrtle Creek mining district. John Hemrich, the Seattle capitalist who is developing the Continental Chieftain group under bond, has just made another payment of \$5000, which brings him up to the final payment of \$10,000 which will complete the purchase price. The work is being prosecuted on a large scale and Mr. Armitage thinks it would not be surprising if 200 men were given work there with a few weeks. This latest payment is divided between G. W. Crews, B. M. Armitage, C. O. White and Mr. Judkins, Mr. Armitage receiving \$1000 as his share.

On Homer Ostman's property a \$2000 payment will be due in a couple of months and there is no doubt that it will be taken up promptly as a good showing is being made.

John Hall and his associates have boned for a year, during which continuous work in the line of development must be done. The work as it is progressing shows up a very promising property.

Altogether the outlook in the district is very flattering and new strikes as valuable as those named above may be looked for in the near future. That a permanent mining camp has been established there, is an acknowledged fact.—Review.

Habitual drunkenness is a direct cause for divorce in 35 states of the Union. It could be extended to women who occupy the unfortunate and hopeless position of the drunkard's wife. The Supreme Court of West Virginia recently decided a case of this kind in favor of the wife, the deciding Justice saying: "No woman is compelled to live with that worst of all brutes—a drunkard brute—to the peril of her health and life."
