From the Coos Bay News.

The Schooner Lizzie Prien, which was damaged by going ashore at the mouth of the Siuslaw, lately, has been repaired.

The keel pieces for the new vessel, to be built at the Marshfield shipyard, were on the ground last week, and the yard around the stocks was being planked preparatory to commencing work.

At a meeting of the Rod & Gun Club held last Thursday evening, committees were appointed to see about procuring wild rice and millet seed, to be planted in the sandhill lakes for duck food; and also a committee to ascertain what imported game birds would be suitable for this section.

Big Money in Spuds.

Dr. J. P. Sargent reports that on 1700 acres on the south fork of the Mokelumne, under his charge, in potatoes, this year, he harvested 45,000 bags of spuds, or about 215 sacks to the acre.

Dr. Sargent tells of an instance. Two parties, one of them Harry Rieger, rented 217 acres on the river at \$10 per acre. They planted the land to potatoes, and Ingles' half netted him over \$5100 for the eight months' work in putting in and taking off the crop.

Peopling the West.

Mr. Harriman and his railroad associates are reported to have formed a more elaborate and systematic scheme for setting up the West tributary to their lines of railroad than has ever before put in operation.

Mr. Harriman, according to reports, will outfit Mr. Hill and his associates in this direction. While the Hill-Morgan syndicate, with low settlers' rates and by other means, are people the vacant lands of Washington Northern Idaho, Southern British Columbia, Montana and the Dakotas with new settlers, the Harriman combination will make even more elaborate efforts to do the same in California, Nevada, Wyoming, Southern Idaho, Nebraska, and, not least if last, Oregon.

The Harriman group of railroads now extends to Portland from two directions; and certainly no portion of the vast territory to its lines is better suited to the purpose in view of furnishing homes for producers.

It is supposed in some quarters that Mr. Harriman's efforts in this direction will have Southern California and other regions more in view than Eastern and Western Oregon, which his two lines traverse; he wishes to people large areas now almost unsettled and unproductive; yet his interests in Oregon are too great for him to overlook this state in any such work.

Pleasant Point Shipyard.

William Ross of Isthmus slough was in town Wednesday. Mr. Ross is contemplating the building of a schooner at Pleasant Point, where the steamer Santa Ana was built a few years ago. He expects to begin work in the near future, and it is to be hoped that nothing will interfere with the carrying out of his project.
