ONE THOUSAND LEFT.
Indian War Veterans and Widows Affected by Pension Legislation.

If the bill providing a pension for the veterans in the Indian Wars from 1817 to 1856, which was passed by the Senate last Tuesday, through the efforts of Senator John H. Mitchell, should be adopted by the lower house and become a law, it will benefit only about 1000 people in Oregon and Washington. The surviving veterans and widows of veterans are supposed to be about that number. Their average age is 73 years. This estimate also includes the widows. According to the rules laid by the old-life insurance companies in making their estimates, these survivors have only five years to live. That a large number of the veterans are married and will leave widows who will draw pensions will not alter the general result, as most of the wives of the veterans are pensioners, and their average age is nearly as great as the veterans. The Senate bill provides for a pension of \$8 per month for the veterans and the widows of veterans. Over 7000 men served in the nine years of Indian warfare in Oregon and Washington. Of this number 1800 were killed on the field of battle—Oregon Mining Journal.

Demand Suffrage.
Sixty-six thousand eight hundred women, textile workers of Lancashire, Yorkshire and Chester, England, have presented a petition to Parliament praying for immediate possession of the franchise, and declaring that the right to vote "is of vital importance to women engaged in the industrial struggle for existence." The trades unionists are supporting the appeal. They say that the demand for woman suffrage will be tirelessly pressed until Parliament yields. The women assure the Westminster legislators that when permitted to vote they will exercise a triumphant force in the direction of social reform and administrative efficiency. Ex.

Inventor of Marvelous Machine.
Thomas W. McCue, an Ohioan, is the inventor of a marvelous machine for removing pain by stimulating the nerves. Thomas A. Edison says that Mr. McCue's invention is the most marvelous machine of the age. Oddly enough, the inventor is neither a medical man nor an electrician. He is just an inventor, and has been studying electrical science only six or seven years. As a young man he lived in California. He has invented a smoke consumer, several toilet apparatuses and an electrical horse-starter. By his last machine he secures a current of one hundred-thousandth of a volt.—Evening Telegram.

18,000 Homeless in One District.
New York, March 4.—Flood conditions in the East are reported rapidly improving, although affairs in the Wyoming valley and north-eastern Pennsylvania generally, and along the Hudson, near Albany, are still in bad shape. Dispatches from Wilkesbarre, Pa., show that more than a score of lives were lost and \$5,000,000 worth of property was destroyed in Northeastern Pennsylvania. The danger is over, but the full extent of the damage is yet to be seen. Eighteen thousand and homeless persons in the Wyoming Valley are anxiously watching the backward course of the waters.

Messages Flashes 2,099 Miles, Bridging The Atlantic Ocean.

New York, March 1.—Signor Marconi, who arrived on the Philadelphia to-day, announced that during the trip across the Atlantic he was able to talk with his station at Poldhouse, Cornwall, without any difficulty up to 2,099 miles, virtually bridging the Atlantic. This is the most marvelous of all the inventor's feats with wireless telegraphy. Mr. Marconi will proceed at once to Canada, there to carry out his part of a contract with the Dominion government. By the terms of the contract the government will contribute \$50,000 toward the erection of a station in Nova Scotia, according to plans and specifications prepared by Marconi himself. Should the station cost more than that amount the additional expenditure will be borne by the company. The rates to be charged between Canada and Great Britain should not exceed in any case the rates charged for similar messages between Great Britain and other parts of North America. Appeal to Reason.

For Profit men are bethering old worn-out horses and selling the meat to the poorer citizens of Chicago. A dispatch from that city says: "Evidence has been obtained that horses and mules by the thousand are sold for beef every year in Chicago. Slaughter houses exist in various parts of the city and suburbs, where the animals are killed and their flesh packed and sold as corned beef, hamburger steak, sausage and other products free in cheap restaurants and lunch saloons. Nags that have become too old, decrepit for work, ringhoned, spavined creatures, and even those afflicted with glanders, sore feet, and various ailments of the equine race are killed for the trade in large numbers.

Big Gar Works For Pacific Coast
Seattle, Wash., Mar. 4.—Active steps have begun for the erection at Ballard of a big plant for the manufacture of freight cars, logging engines, trucks and mill machinery. The plant is to cost upwards of \$200,000 and is expected to be in operation before the end of the year. It will be the pioneer establishment of its kind in the Pacific northwest. The Washington firm is to be utilized on a large scale in the manufacture of freight cars.

The rule for estimating silage, as given in Prof. Henry's Feeds and Feeding, is based upon experiments made with silage a few days after the silo was filled. It is possible in the succeeding weeks and months, some more settling would occur, and thus there would be more silage per cubic foot. At the top of a recently filled silo the silage weighed 17 pounds per cubic foot; at a depth of 10 feet, 33.1 lbs.; the average for 10 feet being 26.1; at a depth of 20 feet, the weight per cubic foot is 46.2 lbs.; the average for the whole is 33.3; at a depth of 30 feet the silage will weigh 56.4 lbs., and the average will be 39.6.

Suicide of Gus Berg.

On Thursday, February 24, Mr. A. Hardenbrook, accompanied by Theron Crook, while on business connected with his duties as road supervisor, visited the cabin of Gus Berg, on Pistol River. They entered the cabin and were lying on a pile of hay in the middle of the floor. They left hurriedly and notified Mr. Raleigh Scott, of Mountain Ranch. Mr. Scott at once notified the proper official and an inquest was held, which resulted in the following verdict: We, the Coroner's jury empanelled and sworn to inquire into the cause of the death of a person found on the South Fork of Pistol River, Feb. 24, 1902, find the following facts: The name of the deceased person is Augustus Berg, a native of Austria, and about 40 years of age, and that his death was caused by a gunshot wound in the left side, inflicted by him—It while temporarily insane. It would seem from appearances, however, that Berg met his death several days before Stewart disappeared.
