It was at first reported the her injuries would be fatal, but later developments prove this to be an error, for which we are exceedingly pleased. Afflictions of this nature are extremely painful and hard to bear for persons of their ages, the old gentleman being 88 this month and Grandma four years younger. From the Coos Bay News.

A number of logging trucks from the Daniels creek railroad were brought down last week for a thorough overhauling. Preparations are being made for logging on an extensive scale during the coming season.

The largest hail stones we have ever seen in this section fell during a hail shower, Thursday last. C. E. Nicholson measured the largest one he could find in his neighborhood, and its dimensions were: Length, 1 1/2 inches; width, 1 1/2 inches, and thickness, one-half inch. Another one was an inch long and two inches in circumference.

If reports can be relied on, the late big tides sluiced out the bar channel making it deeper than ever before. Capt. A. B. Sears, of the steamer South Portland, sounded the bar carefully when he crossed in Monday morning, and reports over forty feet as the lowest water. This is highly satisfactory to those who appreciate the vast benefits derived from the construction of the jetty. All we ask the government to do for now is to make that jetty permanent. Several hundred feet of the encroachment have been leveled by winter storms, and the channel may cut through and flow to the north bay time, resulting in disastrous consequence. A comparatively small amount expended would make the jetty permanent, and insure a channel at all times on the Coos bay bar sufficient for the largest ships.

W. E. S. Salida, Cal., asks which is to be preferred, stanchions or stalls for cows in stable over night. This is one of those propositions where theory and practice are not in full accord. A good many first-class dairymen who have been using rigid stanchions for years and continue to use them, could not be induced to advocate their use, but in some way they fail to convince themselves that rigid stanchions are, in fact, as objectionable as they are represented to be. The probabilities are that if they were building a new, however they would discard rigid stanchions and adopt stalls, or some pattern of swinging stanchions, and there can be no question but what these are more comfortable for the cows; and cow comfort conduces to cow profit.—Hoard's Dairyman.

A California reader asks how much milk a heifer should give, and with what average test to be considered worth keeping. It is quite impracticable to give a direct answer to an inquiry of this character, first, because heifers vary so much in the quantity of milk and its fat content, and second, because it very frequently happens that a heifer with first calf, for reasons that cannot be explained, fails to do herself justice. We should hesitate to condemn a well-bred heifer, even though she might do very poorly the first year. But ordinarily we expect our heifers with first calf to give three-fourths to one pound of fat per day, and keep this up as an average for several months.—Hoard's Dairyman.

Another rich find is reported from the Seven Devils copper belt. The ledge is six feet wide and nearly pure copper.

California will yet care for settlers to take up the 42,000,000 acres which Uncle Sam has for distribution in that State.

Stevens county, Washington, contains the greatest deposit of merchantable marble and onyx of any other known district in the world at the present time.

The Olean Land Company, of Minnesota, purchased two thousand acres of timber from the Enterprise Lumber Company, paying therefor the sum of \$27,50 per acre.

Tyson, Idaho, is the most promising placer camp in the Inland Empire today. The gold which that camp will produce during the next five years will lay the foundation for many substantial fortunes.

Quicksilver ore is reported to have been discovered in large quantities in the Elk Creek district, in Southern Oregon. The ledge is over three hundred feet wide and assays five per cent mercury. Twenty-five cinnabar claims have been located since the discovery a short time ago. The main ledge has been traced for a mile.

\$5,587,000 was the reported sale price of 108,000 acres of oil land in Wyoming, Utah and Colorado, which was transferred to the American Consolidated Oil Company. This syndicate is composed of a number of strong companies, and the bulk of its business will be transacted at San Francisco, Cal.
