The Carl Brothers' combined butter and cheese factory at Norway will be ready to receive milk and cream on Tuesday, April 1st, and for the accommodation of the dairymen they have hired the steamer Maria to carry the milk and cream. The boat will leave Coquille in the morning, coming up the river and will deliver the milk and cream to any of the creameries that the patrons wish to send milk to at the rate of 5c per hundred for milk and 15c per hundred for cream. This is cheaper than the milk has ever been carried. The boat will start April 1st, and carry milk as far up the river as Carl Bros' butter and cheese factory. The boat will run every day including Sunday.

New Steamer Line to Portland.

A company, known as the Oregon Coast Navigation, has been incorporated in Portland for the avowed purpose of putting on a steamer to play between Portland and Coos county points.

The advantages that such a line would be in this county, and the Coquille valley in particular are so numerous and apparent that all should be able to see them.

Portland needs coal, and needs it badly. At present coal is selling at from \$7 to \$20 per ton in Portland, and a limited supply at that.

Portland is a first class market for better, cheese, eggs, poultry, apples, white cedar and myrtle wood.

Thousand of people are flocking into Oregon through Portland, and a weekly line of steamers to Coos County would insure Coos of her share of this influx, and would develop her resources and build up her industries.

Many things can be bought to better advantage in Portland than elsewhere. Flour, feed, hay, logging tools, agricultural implements machinery and the like, for instance.

A closer and more friendly relationship between Coos county and the balance of Oregon would spring up if there was a regular and reliable means of transportation between this county and Portland. Hundreds of Portlanders would visit this section and invest in developing its resources.

It is the object of this company to get the residents of Coos county to become a part of the company; to build the boat in Coos county, and if possible to get some one acquainted with the waters of Coos county to become master of the boat.

This would make it as much a Coos county as Portland enterprise, and the profits earned would be spent in Coos County, and in Portland, and much money that now goes abroad would thus be saved to our people.

Messrs Addis and Wilson, of Portland, are here in the interest of this enterprise, and it is to be hoped that when they return they will be able to tell of a good and lively interest taken by our people, and of substantial encouragements extended by all parties here who are in position to take a substantial interest in this enterprise.
