Died.—On Coos River, March 23, 1902, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bischo. The funeral occurred in this city on Tuesday of this week.

Dr. D. L. Steele, formerly a resident of Marshfield, slipped and fell while about to get aboard a street car in San Francisco, lately, injuring his back and bruising his face badly.

It was lately reported to the Chamber of Commerce, at Portland, that there was only 17 feet of water on the Columbia bar; but Capt. McCoy, of the tugboat service for the O. R. & N., has just finished a complete survey of the bar, and finds a depth of 21 feet.—We can beat that at Coos bay.

The steamer Alert was launched from Christensen & Johnson's ways yesterday and Capt. Edwards expects to place her in commission today. The lengthening out of the Alert has made a fine boat of her and she is now worth twice what she was when first placed in the water.

Captain H. R. Reed received a telegram this week from San Francisco in which he was offered a position as manager of the Boole's extensive shipyard at Oakland Creek. Mr. Reed has not accepted the position as yet, hoping to straighten out his matters here, and will leave on the next steamer for San Francisco with that end in view.

Died.—In this city, March 25, 1902, Sarah, beloved wife of David Holland, aged 68 years, 10 months and 13 days. Deceased had been suffering for many months with cancer, which caused her death. She was a noble woman, a kind and loving mother, and a devoted wife, and her many deeds for the betterment of the community in which she lived endeared her to all with whom she became acquainted.

Her death is a sad blow to the bereaved husband and relatives and the entire community deplore her loss. Deceased was a prominent member of the Episcopal church of this city and always took an active part in the church work. She was born in Dudley, England, and in 1850 was married to David Holland. In 1859, with her husband, she located in Coos county, residing here ever since. Besides her husband, she leaves five children, Mrs. Robert Simpson, Mrs. Wm. Ross, Thomas, William and Parker Holland, all of this county.

The grief-stricken husband and relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community in their hour of grief. The funeral will occur tomorrow (Friday) at 2:30 p. m., from the Episcopal church.

A second and careful investigation of the Gus Berg case, at Pistol River, places at rest the suspicions of foul play, and confirms the correctness of the verdict of suicide rendered by the first jury, the mis-leading reports and suspicions having originated, in the main, by the failure of the first jury and attending physician to make a thorough examination of the body, and by the mysterious disappearance of Joe Stewart from the neighborhood coincident with the finding of Berg's body. Last week a second inquest was held, and an autopsy, at which Dr. Caldwell officiated, developed the fact that there were no bullets in the body. Dr. Caldwell furnishes us the following statement of facts: "1. A bullet hole through left arm, at junction of upper and middle third, entering at inner side of arm. 2. That a bullet had entered left side between seventh and eighth ribs, three inches to left of sternum, ranging upward and forward, cutting off the seventh, sixth and fifth ribs, passing out between fourth and fifth ribs. Death being due to neglect and after effects of wounds." The location of the wounds and the upward range of the bullets indicated plainly that they were self-inflicted, by a rifle in the hands of deceased. There were also powder burns around the wounds. There were numerous evidences of Berg having lived several days after the wounds were inflicted. He had walked around outside, had built a fire and had cooked, blood being found on various articles he had handled. There was no doubt in the mind of every one present last week that the wounds were self-inflicted, but that, making a bad job of it the would-be suicide's nerve failed him and he repented, and was unable to dress his wounds and died for want of proper care. It was the opinion of those present that he lived four or five days after shooting himself. Although Stewart is cleared of all suspicion, the cause of his disappearance still remains a mystery.—The Tribune.
