A Reply.

I notice an article in the Coast Mail of April 5th to which I would like to reply.

The Mail editor goes on at some length to untangle himself from previous bad breaks and then states that if the proposed steamer line under discussion is not to include calls at Tillamook, Yocoma etc, a change of plan has been made since first announcement was made through the press. That is simple enough. The Mail man wrung in these on his own responsibility. I never saw him nor gave him any information, and all this fuss is brought about by his assumption that calls were to be made at these points. That some changes in our programme has been made is true, and those changes have been made in accordance with conditions which exist in Coos county, and of which we did not have adequate knowledge before I came to Coos county.

True, the Telegram reporter mixed up some talk of Tillamook and Astoria in announcing the filing of the incorporation papers, but he did so without authority of the incorporators, and nothing I have said, as representative of the Oregon Coast Navigation Co., could be construed to indicate that we proposed to land anywhere outside Coos Bay and the Coquille River, except to probably put off some flour and feed occasionally at the mouth of the Umpqua.

As to relative markets I would refer the mail editor to the daily quotations in San Francisco and Portland papers. During the ten days preceding the article under discussion the market lists showed butter to be worth 6c per lb more in Portland than in San Francisco.

The Mail man may consider our scheme doubtful and say so if he chooses but his historical raving proves nothing. The incorporators are men whose characters are above reproach. The merchantile houses who are taking stock in the company in Portland are amply able to put the boat on the run but having become accustomed to see the attitude of the Mail displayed in the papers of Marshfield they did not know but that that attitude would hinder and retard trade relations between them and the people of Coos county and in order to determine how much interest the people of Coos county had in a regular boat between Portland and Coos Bay points they sent me down to see how many property owners would subscribe a few shares each, not for the sake of the money so raised, but in order to make the boat a permanent carrier to Coos county. Subscribers are not required to pay a cent until they see all that I have promised being fulfilled, and stock held in Coos county will be paid its regular dividends the same as stock in Portland whenever the boat has earned a profit.

The central idea in Portland is to put on a boat that will stay on, and all that is asked of the Coos county people is to show a desire for such a boat.

If the Mail editor wants information on this subject he had better cease getting his information from irresponsible sources, and get it direct from the representative of the Oregon Coast Navigation Co. in Coos county, for I can assure him I will gladly give him any and all information he may want, first hand and authentic.
