SUDDEN DEATH OF JAMES BROWN.

Passes Away at His Post of Duty Leaves a Wife and Three Children.

James Brown, of this place, died suddenly about noon, Thursday, at his post on the Alert, of which he was engineer. The boat was just about to leave the wharf at the Bay City mill. Mr. Brown had been helping load some lumber and was standing by his engines waiting for the bell when he was seized with the attack of heart trouble which caused practically instant death.

The body was brought to town on the steamer and conveyed to the family home here.

Deceased was born in Scotland Oct. 7, 1853. In 1877 he took passage on the ship Orpheus for the Pacific coast. Landing at San Francisco, he came to Coos Bay and worked in the Eastport coal mine. Later he went to the Coquille where he worked on the river boats and learned the trade of engineer, which he has followed ever since on the waters of the Coquille, Umpqua and Coos Bay, having resided in Marshfield for the last ten years.

He was married at Norway, Oregon, in 1880 or 1881 to Miss Mary Myers, who survives him. He leaves also one daughter and two sons, Gusnie, Claud and Tom, aged 19, 17 and 10 years respectively. Mr. Brown was a man of sterling qualities, a good workman at his business, steady and reliable, a lover of his home and family, of a jovial disposition and well liked by every one. He was a member of the Masonic and Workmen lodges here.—Daily Coast Mail.

Geary Law Re Enacted.

Washington, April 28.—The conference on the Chinese exclusion bill reaches a complete agreement on the bill today. Their report was submitted to the senate and House this afternoon, and in each instance adopted without debate. The bill now goes to the President for his approval, which is issued by the firm stand he has taken for the measure. The Geary exclusion law is extended without any limitation as to time. Operation of the law in the Philippines is placed in the hands of the commission, and is to be extended, as far as applicable, to all American island territory.

Roosevelt Insists On It.

Washington, April 25.—The effort of the republican or majority faction of congress to dodge the Nicaraguan canal issue has apparently aroused the ire of President Roosevelt. He has asked the procrustean body of lawmakers to take some definite step at this session in regard to the construction of the inter-oceanic waterway.
