**Good Roads With Variations.**  
Since the public press of this  
county is just now the freely-used  
medium for ventilating the visionary  
schemes of local theorists for bet-  
tering the condition of our summer  
highways (they are not high in win-  
ter), I ask you indulgence in the  
form of space in your valuable  
paper to place before your readers  
a newly-born but practical plan to  
settle this question in the main, and  
as the heading of this article sug-  
gests, bring in many attending de-  
lights.

We have the remedy full and  
complete in an animal solely our  
own and which can be brought in  
day free. Let me introduce him as  
the "duck of the ox family."  
The water buffaloes are the  
ducks of the ox family. They have  
wide hoofs, and they can swim  
through the swampy rice fields,  
dragging their barrows or plows.  
They can travel over the quicksands  
which swallow up army mules, and  
they are used to drag flat boats and  
sleds over the soft soil. They are  
fond of water, and are to be seen  
lying in every pond or puddle tak-  
ing mud baths. Indeed, they must  
have water very few hours or they  
will go mad, and their owners drive  
them every now and then down into  
the canals for a swim.

These animals do the draying and  
carting of the town and the heavy  
farm work of the country. They  
are also used for riding, and a com-  
mon sight is a farmer going to or  
from work on one of these ungainly  
beasts. The children ride them,  
lying down upon their backs or sit-  
ting with their heads to the horns  
or toward the tail, as they please,  
directing the buffaloes this way and  
that by a kick or a slap. The ani-  
mals are fond of their child masters,  
and submit to them without troub-  
le.

If our County court will buy and  
ship from the Philippines a few score  
of these buffaloes and distribute  
them judiciously through the coun-  
ty, especially supplying those who  
will attend to their propagation,  
the worry and expense of improv-  
ing roads and building bridges will  
vanish.

Traffic will not be impeded winter  
or summer. There are sloughs  
streams and mud-holes suffice only  
near to each other to eliminate all  
danger of the buffaloes going mad  
for want of their native element and  
Coos county people will escape the  
same fate in possessing a sure means  
of crossing each and all of these  
obstacles.

It needs no argument this spring  
to show that they are badly needed  
to put in crops and to carry dairy  
products to market.  
The dairymen could hang all his  
cans of milk on the buffalo's horns  
take a seat on his back and go to  
the creamery with the buoyancy of  
spirits of "a man summoned to a banquet."  
Carpenter's father describes him:  
"The carabao or water buffalo is the  
highest of animals. Like a mixture of  
hippopotamus, a cow and a hog in  
appearance, and it has been described  
as a big hog with horns. It is  
larger than the largest cow. Its  
horns are at least half a yard long,  
and its hair stands out like the  
bristles of a hog. The usual animal is  
a dirty gray or black color, but  
there are some albinos, and they are  
the ugliest of the lot. Their skins  
are a rose pink, their bristles as  
white as snow and their eyes also  
white. Put one of these animals  
into a cart, yoke it there by a bar  
across the neck, and drive it with a  
line through a hole in its nose, and  
you have one of the moving pictures  
of every-day life in Mania. You  
must add, however, the spectacles.  
These are two halves of a brown  
concocted shell, so tied together  
that they completely cover the eyes  
and blind the beast as it were.  
Our schools can all be held during  
the winter months when we awaken  
to the possibilities of this invaluable  
creature.

Each district will keep an "albino"  
for the schoolman to ride and each  
pupil will stride one of a souabe  
hue and with spectacles properly ad-  
justed (on both schoolman and car-  
abao) the perfection and the Coos  
county youth will attain the com-  
forts to which they are entitled.  
Besides, when butchered and  
placed on the market he will fill the  
three-fold purpose of beef pork and  
game.

Thus supplying food for both Jew  
and Gentile, and possibly even the  
vegetarian might be induced to  
tackle him.  
As you know this good roads sub-  
ject is before the people of this  
county politically, at present.  
We have for county judge the  
government ownership candidate,  
the plank roads candidate, and the  
level-head candidate.  
Had the paramount interests of  
the county and incidentally my own  
interests prompted me a few days  
sooner I should have entered this  
campaign as the Water Buffalo can-

didate with a sure cinch on the office.  
Every one can readily see that  
the objections to plank and rock  
roads, that they will settle and set-  
ter, cannot be urged against my  
plan. If the buffalo should sink  
he is sure to come up all right and  
his thick tough hide is a guarantee  
that no scattering will take place.  
While I have missed an oppor-  
tunity to serve the people as county  
judge, by this enlightenment of mud-  
stained fellow citizens I still hope  
to live in their esteem as a bene-  
factor.

**CUT TO THREE CENTS PER MILE.**  
Mr. Harriman Reduces Passenger Fares on  
All Lines in Oregon.

Mr. Harriman says that passenger  
fares on all his lines in Oregon will  
be reduced to three cents a mile.  
He also says that the arrangement  
made between him and President  
Mellen involves letting the Northern  
Pacific as well as O. R. & N., down  
the Snake River from Lewiston to  
Wallula, and it gives the O. R. & N.  
full benefit of the feeders of the  
Northern Pacific in the Clear-  
water Valley. Speaking of the  
Columbia Valley route to the sea,  
Mr. Harriman says the only grade  
in the whole route is the bar at the  
mouth of the river, and he recom-  
mends that "problem of removing  
that grade.

President Mellen says the North-  
ern Pacific will bring its passenger  
trains into Portland over the Van-  
couver bridge as soon as that struc-  
ture can be completed, in about two  
years, but the Dalarna ferry will con-  
tinue to transfer freight trains—Or-  
egonian.

Swept By a Torrent.

Conneville, Pa. May 20.—A  
cloudburst caused the breaking of  
a big breakneck reservoir dam in  
the mountains four miles from here  
this morning. A torrent from a  
5,000,000 gallon lake rushed down  
the White Run valley to the You-  
gheny river.

Houses were torn from their  
foundations and whirled along with  
the torrent. Stock perished in the  
floods, fields were washed out, and  
crops ruined.  
The damage is estimated at  
\$200,000.  
The inhabitants had thrilling  
escapes, but no casualties are re-  
ported.

Mr. Harriman Does not say What he will do.

Mr. Harriman has been asked by  
the Journal if he intends to remove  
the O. R. & N. headquarters to Salt  
Lake for the sake of economy, as  
has been reported he would. Mr.  
Harriman's reply was that he would  
not say so if he does so intend. The  
railroad magnate was likewise asked  
as to what was his attitude toward  
Portland and Oregon. His only  
reply was a reference to the work  
now being done on the roadbed and  
curvatures of the road along the  
Columbia. He said he would in no  
wise outline any policy he might  
have with respect to his roads of the  
Northwest. He told Californians  
that he would spend \$20,000,000 in  
improvements on the system in that  
state. He doesn't say that he will  
spend twenty cents on his lines in  
Oregon, beyond what is already be-  
ing expended.—Portland Journal.

**CUBA A FULL-FLEDGED REPUBLIC.**  
General Wood Raised the Cuban Flag Today.  
The American Officials and Troops  
Then Sail Away.

Havana, May 20.—Senor Palma  
today attached his signature to a  
document as president of the Cuban  
republic, after an exchange of con-  
gratulations, and the veteran Gen-  
eral Gomez ascended to the roof of  
the palace, where he was accorded a  
great reception.  
General Wood personally lowered  
the American colors, which were  
saluted, and with his own hands  
hoisted the Cuban flag, as an act  
of the United States, Gomez assist-  
ing.

General Wood and his staff and  
the American troops embarked im-  
mediately after the hoisting of the  
Cuban flag, and the American ships  
steamed out of the harbor.  
At the time the transfer took  
place in Havana, general Whiteside  
made from Santiago, turned over his  
authority to his Cuban successor and  
sailed away with the American cav-  
alry, which had been in garrison  
there.

New York, May 20.—In a dis-  
patch from Havana, the World pub-  
lishes General Leonard Wood's re-  
view of the work accomplished dur-  
ing the American occupation:  
"Cuba is turned over in a well-  
ordered, healthy condition, and the  
new government will find all de-  
partments well equipped and in  
good running order."

New York, May 20.—In a dis-  
patch to the American and Journal,  
President-elect Tomas Estrada  
Palma says:  
"I have nothing but gratitude for  
the American people for giving us  
our independence. Cuba is grate-  
ful and never will forget what the  
mother of republics has done for her.

Death in a Minnesota Waterspout.

Preston, Minn May 19. The  
waterspout that struck near Preston  
last night flooded the country for  
miles around and caused the  
death by drowning of four children,  
members of the family of Michael  
Willbright, near Forestville and the  
death by lightning of Alderman  
Konvey, of Preston. The property  
loss will be heavy. Reports from  
the western part of the county say  
it was one of the worst storms ever  
witnessed in that section. On the  
level prairies in the township of  
York farmers lost a great deal of  
stock, and near Granger about 20  
buildings were demolished. Eight  
feet of water swept over Preston,  
moving eight or ten houses from  
their foundations. The Chicago,  
Milwaukee & St. Paul tracks were  
washed out for four miles out of  
Preston and the depot twisted  
around.

**Ruin in Path Of A Texas Cyclone.**

Dallas, Tex., May 19.—The death  
dealing storm that swept over Texas  
yesterday afternoon, snuffed out  
the lives of at least 90 persons, in-  
jured over a hundred and left the  
historic little town of Goliad a gaping  
wreck. Within five minutes  
the terrible work of the tornado was  
done, and those who were lucky  
enough to escape with their lives  
ran to the work of rescue. The  
survivors of Goliad are too dazed  
to estimate the property loss, but  
a strip of the town two blocks wide  
and one mile long was swept. The  
damage is heavy. Dead and dying  
animals are mixed with the debris  
that marks the path of the storm.  
The injured are being cared for this  
morning by nurses who arrived on  
special trains late last night.

The storm which swept Goliad  
destroyed much property in other  
portions of the state, but so far as  
known no lives were lost. Shortly  
after noon the storm struck San  
Antonio and demolished property  
to the extent of \$75,000 and injured  
several persons, none seriously.  
Austin also suffered considerable  
property loss. At Mineola a wind  
storm, followed by rain, uprooted  
hundreds of shade trees and blew  
several homes from the foundations.

Goliad, Tex., May 20.—The latest  
estimate of the loss of life in Sun-  
days cyclone is 122. A number of  
the injured will die.

**Explosion Kills 200 Coal Miners.**

Knoxville, Tenn., May 19.—A  
special to the Sentinel says the  
Fraterville and Thistle coal mines at  
Coal Creek, Tenn., exploded this  
morning. Only one man escaped,  
he being blown out of the mine.  
About 300 men were at work in the  
mines. Flames are now issuing  
from mouths and vent holes. George  
N. Camp, superintendent of the  
Thistle mine, gave out an official  
statement estimating the number of  
killed in both mines at 150. None  
has been rescued.

A special to the Sentinel says:  
Two rescuing parties were started  
into the Thistle and Fraterville mine  
entrances as soon as possible after  
the explosion. The Thistle party  
was unable to make any headway  
whatever, as the gas stifled the men  
almost as soon as they entered the  
shaft. The Fraterville party went  
as far as the "parting of the ways"  
into the mine where a heavy fall of  
slate was encountered. This cut-  
off made further progress into the  
mine impossible at present. The in-  
tense heat indicates that the mine  
is on fire.

At 11 o'clock there was no longer  
any question but that the Thistle  
miners also suffered in the disaster.  
At 1:30 o'clock one man was  
taken from the mouth of the Frat-  
erville mine. He was an unrecogniz-  
able mass of flesh.

The crusade for cheap illumina-  
ting gas has resulted in a marked in-  
crease in the number of deaths by  
gas asphyxiation. The companies  
are mixing the cheaper "water gas"  
with coal gas, and the former con-  
tains a greater percentage of the  
deadly carbon monoxide than the lat-  
ter.
