The New Ship Yard

K. V. Kruse has fifteen men at work at the site of his new ship yard below town, and is getting everything in readiness for the construction of the vessel. The work of placing the band saw and machinery in position is practically done, and the sawing out of the frame will commence within a few days. The piling has not yet been driven, but will be put down as soon as A. W. Neal finishes another contract which is about completed. In the meantime, everything will be put in readiness to put the vessel in frame in a hurry. The first vessel to be built will be a four-masted schooner of about 186 foot keel and capable of carrying about 1,000,000 feet of lumber. This is an important addition to Marshfield's industries.—Daily Mail.
