The Rural Northwest. The North Dakota Experiment Station recently issued a bulletin on "Corn Culture." One of the conclusions reached there is that North Dakota needs corn bred specially for local conditions. This is equally true of Oregon. Another conclusion which is of general application is that corn is, next to potatoes, the best preparatory crop for wheat and flax, and is superior to a bare summer fallow. The best results were obtained in that state last year from corn planted in the early part of June.

The opponents of governmental aid to irrigation are doing great work for irrigation farming. The glowing pictures they point out of the success of farming under irrigation will certainly attract the attention of thousands of eastern farmers to the possibilities of the arid region and inspire in them a desire to participate in the benefits to be derived from a supply of water under control upon naturally fertile land with almost perpetual sunshine. The successful development of irrigation farming depends a great deal more upon getting the right kind of people interested in making it a success than it does upon government aid in building reservoirs.

When people become very much interested in any one subject, they lose interest in other subjects which ordinarily attract their attention. In the publication of this paper it has been observed that the few weeks preceding election are a bad time for subscriptions. When everybody has his mind on political questions he does not care for an agricultural paper. The more excitement there has been the more falling off in subscriptions for the time being. This year's subscription business was not perceptibly affected by the election and we infer that most of the voters were not absorbed in politics to the usual extent. This does not imply that they did not take any interest in election, and it is probable that in fact they were in the best possible frame of mind to vote with good judgment.

Pardoned. Frank S. Ingram the man who interfered when Tracy and Merrill were making way with the prison guards at the penitentiary and thereby saving the life of Girod, another of the shop guards and receiving a wound which caused the loss of his leg, was pardoned last Thursday afternoon though we not made aware of it until Friday. He will remain at the prison until he has recovered enough to allow him to go home.

Ingram was known as prisoner 2737. The following history of his case appears on the record: Murder in second degree from Linn county, for life. Committed March 22, 1892. Born in Oregon, was then 33 years old. Height 6 feet 3 inches weight 170; hair dark brown, eyes gray, complexion dark, shoes 10, single, no creed, reads and writes, by occupation a farmer.
