Despite the threatening weather, the 4th of July celebration at Marshfield was an unqualified success. The attendance was good and all had a real good time. Owing to the prevailing mist the exercises of the forenoon were held in the Odd Fellows hall, the oration, being delivered by Rev. R. C. Lee, of that city, the parade being somewhat interfered with by the showers. Immediately after noon the game of baseball took place between the Coquille and Marshfield teams, both of which fell for short of their usual games. The ground was not in best condition, and the ball was constantly wet which made the game not what was expected, during which a painful accident occurred.
