A Snap For A Rent.

The report comes from Germany to the effect that a process has been perfected whereby cloth can be made from wool fiber at about one-half the cost of cotton. It is claimed that the process is practicable from a commercial standpoint.

The Commerce Committee of the House of Representatives has reported favorably a bill which is designed to authorize the perpetration of the gravest inhumanity to cattle. By the provisions of the law these animals may be transported continuously for periods of 40 hours without rest, food and water. The present law limits the periods to 28 hours. Only the prompt protests of humane people will save these helpless creatures from the contemplated hours of torture.
