Saloon keepers, having introduced the custom of serving free lunch with drinks to draw trade are now asking legal ordinances making it a punishable offence to serve free lunch. The lunches have grown so elaborate that they have served to decrease, rather than increase profits.

The American demand for Canadian frogs has gotten that government into difficulties. The Department of Marine and Fisheries has been asked to close frog ponds at certain seasons and was preparing to do so when the local authorities brought forward the claim that frogs are not fish but game and therefore the Department has no jurisdiction. Now the Dominion is engaged in the controversy as to whether frogs are game or fish.

Walter Bolger, an 18-year-old boy has just been found after one of the most remarkable searches in history. He ran away from home last November, and since then his father and detectives have searched all parts of the world. In South Africa both Kitchner and Botha promised to look out for the boy. He was found on a U. S. training ship at Norfolk, Va., enlisted under an assumed name.

Dr. Javal, of the French Academy of Medicine, has advanced the theory of a sixth sense which he calls the "sense of obstacles" and which he believes is located in the forehead. He asserts that in the case of the blind the senses of hearing and touch are not abnormally developed but that of obstacles is, enabling them to apprehend obstacles on their approach.
