It will contribute materially to the wonderful growth that is certain to take place during the coming decade.

## Concerning Pigeon Shooting.

If it true that the trap-shooters are from among the best classes of people, physicians, lawyers and business men, the fact does not humanize or justify the cruel sport of slaughtering and maiming birds as fast as they are liberated from a cage. A lawyer with a gun, peeping away at the feathered innocents as they flutter from the trap door, seeking the freedom for which nature made them, may come from the best classes, but the spectacle is none the less degrading and is revolting to men and women of feeling and sensibility.

The plea that this brutality is necessary to enable men to go afield in season and secure a fair bag of game, is unworthy of men of ordinary intelligence and refinement. The ability to go afield and shoot game on the wing is acquired by going afield and shooting at game not by slaughtering and mutilating trapped pigeons at a distance of a few yards.—Chicago Record-Herald.

## A Queer Man.

A curious character has just died at Union Oregon. He owned a railroad, but never accepted a pass on it, it is said, had never ridden on it, preferring a cayuse to his steam horse. He also possessed a fine residence, which his family occupied, but the greater portion of his time was spent in a cabin near Dr. W. He had three large general stores in Eastern Oregon, filled with clothing, yet he only wore overalls, a cheap cotton shirt, a pair of cowhide boots and an old wool hat. He owned a \$10,000 flouring mill at Drewsey, but he had never been inside of it, though he passed it almost daily. With every reasonable luxury on earth at his command, a splendid home, and a devoted wife always pleading for him to come and remain at home, he preferred a rude cabin in the alkali desert, a board bed, and bacon and beans, and the companionship of cowboys and sheepherders.—Corvallis Times.

## Nearly A Thousand Miners Entombed.

JOHNSTOWN, July 10.—An explosion in the Cambria coal mine occurred about noon today. It is reported that 800 men are entombed and the loss of life will be terrible. The mine is situated in a lonely place.

Some escaped miners who were themselves nearly suffocated, informed the rescuers that unless work was carried on quickly all the men in the mine would perish.

Some of the men are miles underground and it may be weeks before the bodies are recovered.

The explosion literally tore the mines up and tons of earth and rocks are piled up on the bodies of the unfortunate. The work of rescue is being carried on as fast as possible.

Last year there were 1,846 marriages between white and negroes in New York state. 920 white men married negro women and 926 white women married negro men.

The largest cotton denim mill in the world has been contracted for at Greensboro, N. C. The mill will make blue denim goods exclusively and will operate 3,000 spindles. There are already two immense cotton mills at this same place.

The report comes from Germany to the effect that a process has been perfected whereby cloth can be made from wood fiber at about one-half the cost of cotton. It is claimed that the process is practicable from a commercial standpoint.

The recent census gives the total number of ice making plants as 787 with a capital of \$38,204,054 and an output valued at \$13,874,513, fully half of the plants being located in the northern states. Thirty years ago there were but four ice making plants and they were all located in the South.

A French company has been recently formed whose object is to conduct political campaigns for a monetary consideration. The aspiring candidate can secure from them, for a stipulated sum, posters, agents, orators and audiences. In the event of the candidate failing of election one-half the contract price is re- mitted.

Bishop Fallows, of Chicago, chairman of the committee on ethical and religious organizations, is endeavoring to organize a parliament of religions to be held in that city in connection with the Olympic games to occur there in 1904. It is his intention that every nation that has been invited to compete in the games be also invited to send representatives to the religious parliament.

The Commerce Committee of the House of Representatives has reported favorably a bill which is designed to authorize the perpetration of the gravest inhumanity to cattle. By the provisions of the law these animals may be transported continuously for periods of 40 hours without rest, food and water. The present law limits the periods to 28 hours. Only the prompt protest of humane people will save these helpless creatures from the contemplated hours of torture.
