The fall term of the State Normal, at Drain, Oregon, will open Monday September 8th, with a full faculty of specialists.

The laboratories and library will receive material additions and all work will be given, as nearly as possible, by the laboratory method. Physical training will receive due attention. The training department is in excellent condition, affording the practical in a teacher's preparation. A teachers' review class will be maintained, and permission granted to those of certain experience to avail themselves of the training department.
