The cinders which the county had placed on the road from Marshfield to Empire, and which Marshfield has been putting on her streets fully demonstrates their usefulness in road building. While this already used is made in a different manner from that described in the article, it is virtually the same, and all the materials necessary to make it right along the roadway, thus reducing the hauling to a minimum.
