Attempted Suicide of Henry Ploeger.

Henry Ploeger, of Marshfield, was found Saturday afternoon at about 2 o'clock in a precarious condition. It seems Mr. Ploeger in a fit of mental derangement tried to commit suicide by severing his wrist and also his throat, in the former he cut all the cords and arteries and cut a gash across his throat about 4 inches long, severing it to the wind pipe.

Mr. Ploeger stated that he made the attempt at his life Friday afternoon and had wandered in the brush and hills between Ferndale and West Marshfield all night long.

Mr. Ploeger is a highly respected citizen and his friends sincerely regret this rash act. He is a Mason, a K. P. and a Workman. He served as assistant light house keeper for over six years, having but recently resigned this position and moved with his family to Marshfield.

It was found necessary to amputate his hand and Mrs. McCormac, Horsfall, and Gross performed the operation and he revived slowly, but is very weak. He was removed to his home last night about 9 o'clock.—Daily Coast Mail.
