A wave of reform is sweeping the Indian Territory. Every gambling house in Muskogee has been closed and the gamblers have flown to a more congenial climate. A new district attorney, who issued the order, was the cause of the changed condition of things. The same order will stop the selling of whiskey by the drug stores.

The democrats of the tenth congressional district of Georgia have insisted that Thomas W. Hardwick, their candidate for Congress, shall stand upon this platform: "Repeal of the 14th and 15th amendments to the Federal Constitution and the withdrawal of the ballot from the hands of the colored man, and of all the citizens of the United States who are not of the Anglo-Saxon race."

The retail price of coal in New York has been advanced to \$8.50 per ton. Some of the dealers are demanding \$9.50 and \$10.

The contract for constructing the liberal arts building for the World's Fair has been let for \$475,000, the building to be completed by April 1, 1903.

Another 20-story skyscraper to cost \$2,250,000 is about to be erected on lower Broadway, N. Y., and is to have 12 passenger elevators.

The Union Metal Company, with a capital of \$300,000, to be located in Chicago, has just been formed with the avowed purpose of "fighting" the Match Trust.

Italian women are said to be engaged in painting the buildings on the state fair grounds at Syracuse, N. Y., and the painters' union of that place is up in arms against it.

The residents of the District of Columbia are to honor the memory of the late Commissioner Ross by the erection of a statue or the placing of a bronze tablet in a suitable place, to cost not less than \$1,000.

In line with the changed policy of our army in the Philippines toward the native General Cuafees has committed the sentence of the native who murdered Lieutenant Paul D. Stockley of the 21st U. S. Infantry, to 30 years imprisonment.

The Oregon State Fair this year promises to be the grandest industrial exposition and livestock show ever held on the coast. The fair has been good the past two years, but it will be better this year. Don't fail to see it.

Prince Henry, of Germany, has sent a number of presents as souvenirs of his visit, to the different public officials and others who treated him courteously, and the said officials are perplexed because the constitution plainly prohibits any official of the Government from receiving any gift or emolument from any foreign prince or potentate.

Washington, D. C., is very much agitated over a local tax and license law which went into effect July 1. It practically affects everybody, many of them unpleasantly, and, as they claim, in a way contrary to the Constitution of the United States. All personal property outside of household articles, is taxable, the tools of a man's trade not being exempt. In addition to the tax, a specific license to pursue any given business or profession is required in many instances.

Commissioner of Immigration Williams, of New York, has sixty homeless and destitute people on his hands that he don't know what to do with. They were picked up at sea in a shipwrecked condition. Under the law they cannot be admitted to the country, and the Commissioner has conferred with the Washington authorities for instructions whether to deport them to the Cape Verde Islands, where they belong, or admit them to this country.

A St. Paul, Minn., paper reports that drinking among the society women has become such a growing evil that the most aristocratic club of the city, and the one most patronized by the ladies, the "Minnesota," to save itself from serious scandal, has taken official action and ordered, that no women will be served with drinks in the future, except with meals. The abuse of the drink habit had become so noticeable that women were frequently seen leaving the club house in a hilarious mood, and, upon one occasion, a cab was needed to carry an intoxicated woman away.

Marshfield is to Have A fine Hospital. The following telegram, accompanied by a large illustration of the building appeared in the Oregonian of the 27th ult.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—For many years the want of a hospital for the Coos Bay country has been seriously felt. This is, in all probability, about to be supplied, by the erection of a hospital in Marshfield in the near future. Plans have been prepared by David B. Emerson, an architect of Newport, R. I. The most desirable block in Marshfield has been purchased for a site, and as soon as the subscription list is far enough advanced work will be commenced and carried on to completion. The hospital will be in charge of the Sisters of Mercy from Chicago. The dimension of the building will be: Length, 100 feet; general width, 36 feet, and one wing 60 feet. It will cost \$12,000 to \$15,000. Of this sum, \$5000 has been subscribed. The generosity already shown by the people of Coos Bay assures the success of the undertaking.
