Presid of Narrowly Escapes Death.
Lenox, Mass, Sept. 3.—An electric car running at a speed of 40 miles an hour struck a lad carrying President Roosevelt, Secretary Cortelyou and Secret Service Officer Craig, this morning, instantly killing the latter, slightly injuring President Roosevelt, who was cut and bruised but instantly sprang to the assistance of Craig. Cortelyou was uninjured.
In addition to the first named in the party was Congressman Lawrence, of Massachusetts who was bruised.
The car struck the carriage from the rear and the party were hurled into the air, the wreck of the carriage striking after they fell.
Cortelyou became unconscious from the shock, and the first question he asked when he revived was: "How is the President?"
The military guard of four mounted men first gave aid, assisted by Secret Service Agent Taylor and Postoffice Inspector Meyers. President Roosevelt was attended by Dr. Lutz.
Craig's body was found under the car and he was killed.
Driver Pratt saw the car and tried to urge his four horses across, and the motor man attempted to stop, but the impetus was too great.
At Stock bridge were the party was taken for lunch the President stopped out of his carriage, plainly under great mental distress, and told the silent assembled throng of the accident. He paid a tribute to Craig, saying: "My faithful friend is killed."
Mortman Madden and Conductor Kelly were arrested, as the passengers claim the car raved down the hill if it intercept a review which was passing President Roosevelt and party.
Driver Pratt died from his injuries. The president is greatly grieved over Craig's death, the latter being a personal friend.
After Jay E. Adams' recent visit at this city, he called on Rev. A. H. Mulkey on his way to Portland and succeeded in driving a bargain with Mr. Mulkey in regard to opening our Academy. Mr. Mulkey writes us he will be ready to open the school the first of next month. The past proves Mr. Mulkey to be an adept at building up institutions of this kind, and just now it seems to be an opportune time for this school to be started again. In case our town continues its present growth, it will only be a short time until greater facilities will be required, beside, there is at present, a demand for the teaching of grades higher than those of the common schools which this will supply. There are a great many young men in this valley who should embrace this opportunity and finish up their educations in such a manner that it will be of the greatest service possible in after life by carrying some of the most important branches well along. There are several months in winter which young men can use to little advantage, and one winter well spent upon certain lines will make a great difference in his business abilities for the future.

Strike Soon To End.
Senator Thomas C. Platt, of New York, says that the coal miners' strike will be settled within two weeks. He states this positively, and adds that he knows what he is talking about. As he is in close touch with the coal trust and other trusts, it is to be inferred from his statement that the coal trust, having forced the price of coal up to the desired notch, and diminished the supply so that the price can be kept up to an extortionate figure during the Fall and Winter, will yield to the miners' demands sufficiently to effect a settlement of the strike. The coal trust has played the game to suit itself all the way through. It wanted the strike, but it soon wanted coal to sell, and so will settle the strike, giving some little sop to the miners, while extorting millions from consumers of coal.—Evening Telegram.
