J. D. Benham, a former residence of this county, who has spent the past five years in Lake and Modoc counties, this state, returned last week, and on Friday had quite a runaway experience as he was coming into town. He had previously arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Brownson, of the Middle Fork, parents of his wife, having driven in by team via Roseburg, and leaving Mrs. Benham and children there had proceeded to his place about two miles above Fairview, where he left his wagon load of household goods they were bringing in, and then came to town for a cook stove and other supplies with which to go to keeping house. As he was just getting to the edge of town on the Cunningham creek road he met P. E. Drane, one of our butchers, driving a beef animal to the slaughter pen. Just after they had passed the attention of Mr. Drane and Austin White, who was helping him, was attracted by the running of Mr. Benham's team. On returning they found he was thrown from the wagon at the first starting of the team which was making a mad run down the road toward town. Mr. Benham was found to be in an unconscious condition and remained so for about an hour, but aside from being somewhat bruised up was not seriously injured. The horses ran to the end of the first bridge this side of Mr. Quirk's residence where one horse went on the bridge and the other missed it, going down the hill beside the bridge. Here the wagon turned over and the harness throw the one from the bridge clear over the other where he fell badly tangled in the harness. After extricating himself he was caught by one of the neighbors. The wagon and harness were somewhat damaged, but not seriously injured. Mrs. Dr. White was called to Mr. Benham's aid and did what could be done to relieve him of his suffering. After recovering consciousness he could not remember what caused the horses to run.
