City Ordinance.

An ordinance prohibiting minors from frequenting, or going into saloons or bar rooms, and to prohibit the selling, giving, or supplying minors with spirituous, malt or vinous liquors within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, Oregon.

Section 1. Any person under the age of twenty-one years frequenting or going into any bar room, saloon, or tipping place within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, or into any room adjacent to any saloon, used in connection with the business of said saloon, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 2. Any saloon keeper, bar tender or person in charge of any saloon or bar room, in said City of Coquille, who shall knowingly permit any person under the age of twenty-one years to frequent or remain in the saloon or bar room under his charge, or any room used in connection with the said business, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 3. Any person under the age of twenty-one years, who shall go into, or frequent any bar room, saloon, or tipping place and declare that he is over twenty-one years of age, when his age is questioned, with the object of determining his right to remain, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 4. Any person selling, giving or supplying spirituous, malt or vinous liquors to minors within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 5. Any minor who shall be called upon to testify to any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall not be punished for violating the provisions thereof when his testimony incriminates himself.

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 20.—Up to noon today 93 dead bodies of victims of last night's panic at Shiloh Baptist Church (colored) had been identified. As nearly as can be figured at this hour, the number of dead is 116, while no accurate estimate can be placed on the number of injured. Among those identified are the following: Rev. G. W. Sledge, Guntown, Miss.; Rev. L. R. Price, New Orleans; Rev. P. H. Johnson, Wier City, Kan.; Rev. Ford, Pratt City, Ala.; John Houston, Pittsburg, Kan.; Rev. Allen, Chattanooga; Rev. William Stone, Greenville, Miss. In the list of dead there are 65 Birmingham negroes, among whom are the Rev. James Kelly and Dr. A. L. Hill. The majority of these from Birmingham who were killed were women. The unidentified dead are supposed to be those people from out of the city who came to attend the negro Baptist convention.
