## Cholera in Philippines.

Manila, Sept. 30.—It is understood that 5124 cases of cholera and 2740 deaths from that disease were reported in the Province of Ilo-Ilo, Island of Panay, on Monday. This is the highest record for any district since the outbreak of the disease occurred, and exceeds the total of Manila and many of the provinces since the commencement. The town of Misago in the Province of Ilo-Ilo, was the worst sufferer, 1173 cases being reported there Monday.  
At Cabetaun there were 869 cases, and at Dumanges 395 cases were reported on Monday. The people are fleeing to the mountains leaving the dead unburied and the dying, uncare for. The Government has ordered additional doctors and medicines to be sent to Ilo-Ilo. The number of victims makes ordinary measures impossible. The total for all the provinces Monday was 5390 cases and 3061 deaths.

For the improvement of East First street, City of Coquille, Oregon:  
In accordance with an ordinance adopted by the Common Council of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, and approved by the mayor thereof, September 23d, A. D. 1902, the City Recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for the repair and improvement of the extension of First street; the building of a bridge at the junction of Hall street and extension of First street, and the repair and improvement of the "further extension of First street," in accordance with plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Recorder and subject to inspection by contractors.  
The first mentioned section to west line of Hall street is 166 feet; the second, at Hall street junction is 80 feet; the third, east of Hall street, on the "further extension of First street" is 74 feet.
