There will be elections held today in forty states and territories of our great union, being all but Oregon, Maine and Vermont. A few of the southern states have held state elections and but the three mentioned having already elected members of congress. Full state tickets will be elected in twenty-one states, and legislatures in twenty-two states.

Mr. Olyphant, president of the Delaware & Hudson, one of the coal railroads, says the operators made concessions not to the miners but to humanity. But this concession was not made until it became almost certain that if the strike were not settled soon the people would take the coal mines. And the price of coal this winter may not be confirmatory of Mr. Olyphant's statement.—Telegram.

The United States is virtually out of debt to foreigners. It is estimated that of the \$782,224,330 of outstanding U. S. bonds, only \$16,022,850 are held by foreign insurance companies doing business in this country and are deposited in various state treasuries. Nearly all our bonds are now owned by Americans, and a majority of them, it is said, by people of comparatively moderate means.—Telegram.

During a recent farwell sermon preached in a fashionable church in New York, the Rev. Dr. Van Dyke said: "Make your life more simple, even if you have to make it less fashionable. The world wants to see a real difference between Christians and other people in their attitude toward money. A Christian can use money as a servant, but if he makes it the ruler of his life, his practical God, then his Christianity is a lie. Men blame the church for paying too much reverence to wealth. It is not the church that is at fault; it is the people who make up the church."

The difference between law and justice is again shadowed forth in a legal decision. This one is by the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon, and from it we are given to understand that a saloon-keeper is not to be guided by a young man's word as to whether he is 21 or not. It is obvious that the man behind the bar is in serious case when applied to by a youthful man with the price. If he serves him and he is under 21 he is liable to arrest. If he refuses him and he is over 21, he makes an enemy. It has long been argued with much force of justice that the saloon has done its full duty when the applicant is asked as to his age and replies that he is 21 or more. As to the entire justice of this arrangement, few habits of the saloon would express a moment's doubt. But the Supreme Court says otherwise. The saloon must take all the chances. The law looks with approval upon the probability that the saloon will either offend a customer or earn a fine. This is because the law looks with disapproval upon the saloon. It exists under sufferance. It is the enemy of the home, the birthplace of vice, the incubator of crime. The law and the courts are not concerned to give it justice, but to encourage its path with all available thorns and pitfalls. The victim always has his remedy. He can do something else.—Oregonian.

Land Commissioner Hermann Submits His Report.

Washington, Nov. 3.—The report of Commissioner General of the Land Office, Binger Hermann, was made public today and it shows that the disposed of 6,350,000 acres of land during the past year; 1,000,000 acres more than that of last year.

He recommends the repeal of existing laws, covering timber reserved for public lands, and a general law enacted instead, which provides ample protection to forests, and at the same time permits settlers, miners and others to secure sufficient land for legitimate needs.

He also recommends an increased number of wardens and agents for protection to timber lands.

He also wants a bill passed empowering the president to set apart for national parks such tracts of land as are desirable to retain for public use, where scenic beauty, natural wonders and medicinal springs, warrant such reserves.

Salem, Oct. 24.—This evening Attorney-General Blackburn rendered an opinion to Governor Geer, in which he holds that the initiative and referendum amendment is now in effect, and that the people can avail themselves of its provisions, without any legislation prescribing a mode of procedure other than that prescribed by the amendment itself. It is known that the Governor has said that if legislation is necessary before the amendment can be put in effect, he will call a special session for that purpose.

This question he has considered of great importance. Several days ago he submitted the matter to the Attorney-General, and that official investigated the subject in all its bearings. The opinion cites various provisions of the amendment, showing that the purpose was to secure to the people the power to initiate desired legislation and enact the same, independently of the legislature, and to order that any act of the legislature be submitted to them for approval or rejection.

After discussing the principles of construction of laws, Mr. Blackburn lays down the rule that "a constitutional provision may be said to be self-executing if it supplies sufficient rule by means of which the right given may be enjoyed and protected, or the duty imposed may be enforced." The closing clause of the amendment is then quoted, as follows:

"Petitions and opinions for the referendum shall be filed with the secretary of state, and in submitting the same to the people he and all other officers shall be guided by the general laws and the act submitting this amendment, until legislation shall be especially provided therefor."

The opinion holds that the provisions of the amendment provide for the filing of necessary petitions with the secretary of state; that they prescribe the minimum number of legal voters whose names shall be signed thereto; that they provide the rule for determining whether or not each such petition has the requisite number of names of legal voters attached to it, and that when the petition is filed, all that is necessary is that he shall submit the matter as petitioned for.

It is held that the provisions for submission of a measure is mandatory upon the secretary of state. The opinion holds, therefore, that the amendment "supplies a sufficient rule by means of which the right given may be enjoyed and protected." And that it is therefore self-executing and now in force and effect.

Work is stacking up at the Coos Bay iron foundry until the capacity of the plant is inadequate to meet the demand of the growing trade. Messrs. Hoffschmidt & Nelson have decided to enlarge their plant. A two-story building (48x48) is to be built at once. The upper floor will be utilized as a pattern shop, and the lower floor as a machine shop. In the moulding room a 5-ton furnace will be installed so that larger castings can be made. This week the foundry cast three sets of bits for the schooner in the Marshfield yard that weighed 850 pounds each. Five men find constant employment in this enterprise and with the present prosperous outlook the force will have to be increased.—Sun.

All Not Served in South Africa.

New York, Oct. 27.—Gloomy accounts of the state affairs Cape Colony, the Orange Colony and the Transvaal have been received here from time to time through private channels, but there has been a tendency to discredit them, as the London correspondent of the Tribune. The announcement of Colonel Secretary Chamberlain's decision to proceed to South Africa, in order to examine on the spot the problems presented by the termination of affairs in the new British colonies consequently caused the most surprise in political circles. It is tolerably certain, declares the correspondent, that if the situation had not been one of peril the colonial secretary would have left the whole matter absolutely in the hands of Lord Milner.

The feeling between the British and Dutch people in Cape Colony just now is said to be more bitter than it was before the war. The Transvaal and Free States colonies are worn freely in the Dutch towns of the Cape. The loyalists are naturally alarmed at this state of things.

To Fight Trust Goods

Omaha, Oct. 29.—Four hundred and fifty cigar and tobacco dealers of this city and South Omaha last night formed a branch of the Retail Cigar Dealers' Association of America, and will make a fight on trust-made goods. In the organization are cigar stores, drug stores and saloons which, it is stated, will refuse to sell cigars made by trusts.
