The Oregonian recently published an estimate of the value of the leading producers of Oregon for the present year. It places the value of the grain produced at \$8,750,000; live stock sold, \$9,600,000; hops, \$3,500,000; wool, \$2,800,000; fruit, \$1,500,000; dairy products, \$1,500,000. We believe these are very close estimates except in the case of dairy products, the value of which for this year will exceed \$4,000,000. There are also some decidedly important omissions. The poultry products of the state for the year will foot up at least \$2,500,000. The potato crop amount to about \$1,500,000; miscellaneous vegetables to about \$1,200,000. The most valuable single crop of the state is hay, but the greater portion of it is represented in the sales of live stock, dairy products and wool.—Ex.

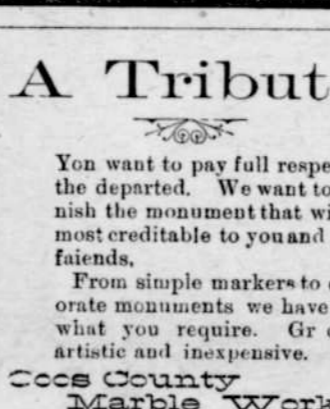
