

Owing to the large and continuously increasing circulation of the HERALD it has been necessary to install a power press on which to turn out our edition in a reasonable time. For this reason we recently ordered a Cambi; Cylinder press which arrived by last Saturday's freight train and which we now have up and upon which this edition was gotten out. And while there are some slight defects in our first attempt to put out an addition with the new machine, we are highly pleased with the results so far. We had never seen a press of the kind before, and as a matter of course, setting it up and getting it in working order was quite a job for us, but what we lacked in skill we made in time and hard work. This is the first power press ever brought into Coos county, and while it does not compare with the large daily presses, it is a long step ahead and a big improvement over our old Washington, hand press. We respectfully invite you to see this new machine.

Coal Strike Commission At Work.

SCANTON, Pa., Nov. 14.—The Anthracite Coal Strike Commission appointed by President Roosevelt to attribute the difference existing between the mineworkers of the hard-coal fields of Pennsylvania and their employers today began the hearing of testimony by which it will determine whether the workmen are receiving fair and just wages for their labor, and whether their conditions should not be improved. The star witness for the miners, President John Mitchell, took the stand in the forenoon, and when the commission adjourned at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, he was still under the fire of cross-examination by David W. Wilcox, general counsel for the Delaware & Hudson Company. It was a trying day for the miners' leader, but he seemed to stand the test well. The heaviest fire of cross-questions was aimed at him late in the afternoon session, and when the hour of adjournment was reached, Mr. Wilcox was still propounding questions and testing Mr. Mitchell's memory. —Oregonian.

E. C. Penton, of Portland, who is making a tour of the coast in the interest of the Oregonian, made our office an exceedingly pleasant call yesterday, and to our great satisfaction gave us some valuable pointers in setting up our new press, being a practical printer and newspaper man. Street-Cars for Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Nov. 14.—(Special).—A street railway company, composed of local capitalists, filed articles of incorporation here today. The capital stock is fixed at \$100,000, divided into 2000 shares of \$50 each. The headquarters of the new corporation are in the new Great Central townsite addition to Roseburg, and street car lines to be operated either by electricity or steam are to be extended throughout the city and its new additions. The stockholders will meet tonight to elect directors. The incorporators are: C. A. Sehlbrede, S. C. Flint, and F. E. Alley, who announce that most of the capital is furnished by local people, although some gentlemen from Deschutes are also interested. It is the intention immediately to begin surveying and locating the proposed lines.

Besides building in town it is said the company will extend its lines out 15 miles into Lookingglass Valley. Building operations on the new townsite addition have been seriously hampered for the past two weeks on account of inability to secure the necessary materials. Cars for bringing in lumber and shingles are almost unobtainable.

The Rebekah's Entertainment.

On last Thursday evening an entertainment was given by local talent in this city under the auspices of the Rebekah degree, I. O. O. F., for the purpose of swelling their piano fund, which proved a grand success. The play "A Cheerful Liar" was handled in a masterly way by several characters who are familiar on the boards to our people while two or three made their first appearance before the public on this occasion. However, the performance was all and more than the public anticipated and therefore was highly appreciated. The proceeds highly satisfactory, being eighty odd dollars, which nearly pays for their fine piano. A performance of this kind, given for a worthy cause is always appreciated and well supported by our people.

Eight Saved.

Wellington, Nov. 14.—Another raft from the ill fated steamer Elmagin, wrecked on Three Kings Island, last Tuesday, has been picked up by the gun-boat Penguin. There were on the raft eight living and eight dead. The survivors were in a pitiable condition and had endured excruciating suffering. Three steamers are searching for the further survivors.

Safecracker Makes a Big Haul At Newberg.

Newberg, Nov. 15.—After an interim of about four years the depot at this place was broken into by an unknown burglar last night and robbed. The robber made his entrance through the freight room and was so well acquainted with affairs inside that he was able to open the safe by the combination. An express package which arrived last evening for the Chehalis Valley Milling Company, and which contained \$1180, was taken out. Nothing else except some Western Union receipts is missing.

Anarchist Sought Life Of King.

Brussels, Nov. 15.—Three shots were fired at the King of the Belgians this morning as he was proceeding to the Cathedral to attend a tedeum in memory of the late Queen Marie Henriette. No one was hurt. The man who fired the shots is an Italian. He stood in front of the Bank of Brussels on the Rue Royale. The other chambers in his revolver proved to be blank, and it is presumed that these fired were equally harmless. The man was arrested immediately, and the police had some trouble in rescuing him from the hands of the crowd. He gave his name as Rubino. When examined by the police Rubino confessed that he intended to shoot King Leopold, and said he had anarchist beliefs.

Lands Hop Production.

EGGERT, Or., Nov. 10.—An estimate has been made of the number of bales of hops produced in this county this season by the best count that can be made the number is between 5800 and 5900 bales or about 1,160,000 pounds. Few growers here sold their crop under contract, and nearly the entire crop yields the growers from 20 to 25c per pound.

The Taurus Launched.

The new schooner was launched yesterday from the Marshfield yard, being christened "Taurus" by Mabel Lang as she slid down the ways. The launching went off without a hitch, and the vessel presents a handsome appearance as she lies at her dock in readiness for her rigging. — Coast Mail.

The new hotel, saw mill and other factories already assured will give it a great impetus. It is generally conceded that under the able leadership of Mr. L. J. Simpson, it will be an unequalled success. North Bend through its prominent location will be one of the strong factors in the building of a seaport city on the magnificent Bay. — Coast Mail.
