Ordered that a tax levy of 30 mills on the dollar on a net valuation of \$2,852,754 be made for state, county, school and road purposes, to be divided as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Category and Rate. State tax 5.4 mills. School tax 5.0 mills. Indigent Soldiers' Fund .1 mills. County tax 11.0 mills. Road Fund 8.5 mills.

Note.—At first glance it would appear that the tax levy is 2 mills higher than last year, but in reality it is only 1/4 mill higher, as the tax of 1 1/4 mills on the dollar which was collected by the Road Supervisors last year, will be collected by the Sheriff this year, and is included in the above levy, thus when you have paid your taxes to the Sheriff on the 1902 roll, you will have paid all taxes except the road poll tax, which will be collected by the Road Supervisors.

Above levy based on estimate expense including State, School, County, Road and other purposes, interest on warrants, etc., of \$80,547.04, balance, if any, to be applied on existing indebtedness.

Contract for printing tax, bridge and other notices and matter ordered by the county officials awarded to the Coquille City Bulletin at the rate of 2 cents per line single column and 3 cents per line double column.

Ordered that the Clerk issue warrants to the Sheriff for the collection of delinquent taxes.

Sheriff given credit for double and wrongful assessment.

Whereupon Court adjourned for the term this 16th day of January, 1903, at 4 o'clock.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission reports that for the year ending June 30, 1902, there were 14,983 persons appointed from its registers. This was 4,692 more than was ever before appointed in a single year. Charles Gressen Made President.

McMinnville, Or., Jan. 19.—At the annual meeting of the Oregon Fire Relief Association the board of directors elected Charles Gressen, president; E. Northup, vice-president; A. C. Chandler, secretary, and E. C. Apperson, treasurer, and fixed the salaries of the president and secretary each at \$1500. The new president will devote his whole time to the work.

Division 4, section 1, was amended so as to permit the board to levy and collect two assessments at the same time, collecting such portions thereof each month as may be necessary to meet the requirements of the associations, provided that on all short-time risks for six months or less but one assessment shall be collected.

Resolutions of appreciation of the services of the retiring president were passed.

It was voted as the sense of the trustees that to F. J. Martin is due great credit for the work that he did in starting the association, and that they had full confidence in his integrity.

It was voted to transfer \$6000 from expense fund to the loss fund. This represents a saving in the association's expenses to the stockholders.

Two trustees are to be appointed to audit all bills on the day before each quarterly meeting.

Mr. Gressen, the new president, is a native of Germany, and is a long-time resident of this city. He is the father of this mutual insurance, which has grown since 1894, from the first policy issued to him, into an aggregate of over 20,000 policies, representing over \$13,000,000 of insurance in force, and increasing at the rate of over \$2,000,000 per year.

Mr. Gressen has in his possession the original draft of the compact of citizens here to start this company. It bears the date January 10, 1894, and is in his hand-writing. F. J. Martin, of Seattle and O. H. Irvine, now deceased, were co-founders with him. Under his management the company is likely to make great strides than ever before, as his entire time will be devoted to it, and his heart is in the work.
