Great Central Sued.

J. J. Walters has brought suit at Portland, against the Great Central Railroad Company, operating in Coos County, to recover \$1429.85, which he claims is due him as commission, and attachment papers have been issued by the sheriffs to attach the property of the defendant company until the case is settled.

Walters stated in his complaint that on August 22, 1902, he was engaged as chief of the bureau of information and colonization of the Great Central Railroad Company, and that a part of his duty was the sales of stock of the company. He further claims that he was to receive a commission for his work, and that he sold \$16,050 worth of stock for which he received \$175.85. He alleges that 10 per cent is a fair commission, and this on basis asks for a balance due of \$1429.85.—Coast Mail.

Republican district convention to nominate a Congressman will be held at Eugene, Thursday, April 9, at 2:30 o'clock. Selection of delegates will be in the regular way by primaries and county conventions. Primaries may be held at any time thought best by county committees, but the county conventions must be held not later than Saturday, April 4.

There were over 2,000,000 feet of lumber passed out over the Coquille bar during February of this year. This is the greatest output for one month yet recorded.

Fox, and George Button, by name, got into the boat and tried to pull down to Bandon from Parker's wharf but the wind being too strong they then started to cross over, half a mile above town. The boys succeeded in getting ashore without difficulty, only suffering the inconvenience of a very cold bath.
