The Prosper Mill Company have been cutting about 40 M feet of lumber a day which is in excess of what is considered the capacity of the mill. We learn that two new boilers and an engine are to be put in which will in crease the capacity to a 50 M per day mill. The company is doing a rushing business, and work moves right along.

Myrtle Point Enterprise.

B. T. VanDecar and Alex Hartle have banded Ira Buzan's quartz mine on Johnson creek.

W. C. and Chas. Guerin returned today from Needles, Calif, where they have been in the employ of U. S. Geological Survey.

Isaac Barklow and wife, who have been at Adams, Eastern Oregon for the past two years, returned to this place Wednesday.

J. J. Carren, of the Myrtle Point hotel, has leased a part of the upper story of the Hermann brick block and will fit up the rooms for the accommodation of his guests.

Sometime, in the dim and distant future, there may be commercial reciprocity between the United States and Cuba.

The cost of irrigation by the Government will materially exceed the estimated cost. According to the latest estimates of the Secretary of the Interior it will be not less than \$11.66 instead of \$5 per acre, and the end is not yet.

Ex-Senator Carter, who talked a river and harbor bill to death, Senator Morgan who almost talked the Panama canal treaty to death and Senator Beveridge, who talked the Omnibus Statehood bill to death, should form a filibusters' union.

The legal profession is a curious one. Ex-Attorney General Griggs once prosecuted a trust for the Government. He is now defending a trust from the Government. We are led to wonder which case the former Attorney General really believes in.

Encouraging reports come from Colombia with regard to the ratification of the Panama canal treaty. At the same time it is worthy of note that most of the cablegrams come from Panama, which would be materially benefited and not from Bogota, the capital of the nation.

The President is seriously considering the demands of the representatives of labor, that labor be represented in the Department of Commerce and Labor, by appointing, as assistant secretary, Mr. E. E. Clark, the railway conductor, who served on the Coal Strike Commission.

Many Men on Strike in East.

New York, April 1.—Building operations to the extent of over \$10,000,000 are suspended today as the result of a general strike among the building trades journeymen.

When the order to strike went into effect this morning 20,000 men laid down their tools and quit work. The men demanded a raise in wages which was refused by the Employers Association. The men were all employed along the Sound shore, Columbus, O., April 1.—Six hundred brewery workers went on strike here this afternoon, demanding an eight-hour lay with the old wage scale for nine hours.

Buffalo, April 1.—The plumbers struck this morning for increase of wages. Two thousand men are involved.

Miners Wages Rise

Pittsburg, April 1.—Today an agreement providing for an advance of wages to the bituminous coal miners of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois goes into effect. Every man about the mines will get an increase of 10 per cent and a one 20 per cent. The change will effect nearly 900,000 men.
