Alliance Reaches Port. San Francisco, April 8.—The steam schooner Alliance, which on Sunday morning, struck an uncharted reef off Point Gorda and was later beached, arrived in port today, having come home under her own steam and with all but four of her passengers on board.

To the fact that the Alliance was an oil burner, Captain Hardwick ascribes the good fortune which attended his efforts. Had the accident occurred while she was burning coal, nothing, he declares, could have prevented her going down shortly after striking the rock. As an oil-burner her furnaces are high and the feeding of the fires a much simpler process. When she was beached at Casper there was five feet of water in her hold.
