We, the undersigned residents and citizens of the County of Coos and state of Oregon, and householders living in the vicinity of the proposed diking district, respectfully state that it is desirable to form a diking district for the purpose of improving by diking certain lands described as:

Lots one and two, southeast quarter and north half of south west quarter, north west quarter, south half and north west quarter of north east quarter, of section 34; the south west quarter and south half of north west quarter, of section 27, all of section 28. Lots one, two, three, four, and north east quarter of north west quarter, north half and south east quarter of north east quarter, section 33. Lot one of section 32, all of section 21, lots one, two and three, and north east quarter of south east quarter, of section 27, all of section 15, all in township twenty seven, south of range 13 west containing 3717, acres more or less which lands are subject to overflow by tide water and by freshets, and are situated in the County of Coos, and state of Oregon. That your petitioners, are the owners of more than one half of the acreage, to be embraced in the district.

And your petitioners respectfully ask that at your next regular term of your court to be held at Coquille City, Coos county, Oregon, on Wednesday, April 1st, 1903, consider this petition and cause notice to be given as by law required, and after hearing the matter proceed and lay off as a diking district and apporportion the cost of the dike among the land owners, and make such other and further orders as shall be necessary in the premises, and your petitioners will ever pray:

To Increase Loan for Water Works System.

Notice is hereby given, that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Coquille, Oregon, held on the 13th day of April, 1903, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, (all the members of said council being present), to-wit:

"It is resolved by the Common Council, of the City of Coquille, that the estimated expense of constructing the present proposed Water System, will cost the city \$20,000, (including the present indebtedness), it is therefore ordered that the proposition of permitting the City of Coquille to incur an indebtedness of \$20,000, be submitted to the qualified voters at the general election to be held in the City of Coquille, May 11th, 1903. That the form of the ballots shall be:

"For incurring \$20,000 indebtedness for Water System. Yes.

"For incurring \$20,000 indebtedness for Water system. No."

These are, therefore, to give notice, that in accordance with the above resolution, the proposition to increase the indebtedness of said city to \$20,000, for the purpose expressed in said resolution, will be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Coquille, at the next general election to be held in said city May 11th, 1903.
