Middle West in Grip of a Blizzard.

Duluth, April 29.—A blizzard is raging here. Trains are delayed, street cars stopped and saw mills shut down. Incoming vessels on Lake Superior say it is the worst snow storm ever known at this time of year.

Sioux City, April 29.—Northwestern Iowa, Northern Nebraska and nearly all of South Dakota, a terrific sleet and snow storm prevails. South Dakota is practically cut off from all communication by wire. This will retard all crops.

Lincoln, Neb. April 29.—Nebraska fruit crop was badly injured last night by a record-breaking freeze, followed by heavy rains.

The latest postal laws are that the publisher can arrest anyone for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under the law, the man who lets his subscription run along for some time unpaid and then leaves orders for its discontinuance leaves him liable to arrest and fine the same as theft. It will be seen that many disputed points are disposed of by that decision, which is certainly just. If a subscriber does not want to renew his subscription, let him notify the publisher. The second decision given here will be a surprise to some publishers who believe that they must stop a delinquent subscriber if ordered to. The delinquent must pay up if he wishes to discontinue his subscription. Otherwise he is held responsible for it as long as the paper is being sent to him, whether he takes it from the post-office or not.—Eugene Guard.

Mr. and Mrs. John L. Bounds disabled by a Pistol.

During some sort of domestic difficulty in the Bounds family yesterday, John L. Bounds received a shot in the knee from a pistol in his wife's hands and the lady also received a flesh wound in the knee, neither wound being serious.

It is understood that the two were struggling for possession of the gun when the shots were fired. The matter is not likely to get into court.

Believe it was a Volcano.

Vitoria, April 30.—The town of Frank is being deserted by the inhabitants. Ominous sounds are coming from the mountain, and all fear a repetition of the eruption. The reports are unanimous that the disaster was due to an earthquake or volcano. The whole top of the mountain seems to have been blown off.

The town was completely overwhelmed. Full rows of houses are ruined. Rescue parties are still working and mounted police are hurrying to the scene. The railroad track is ruined for miles and the mine and buildings are demolished.

Montreal, April 30.—Canadian Pacific officials gave out a statement today that the Frank disaster was caused by an immense land slide, a water way being cut.

The loss of life is not known. Thirty miners are believed to be entombed and efforts are being made to liberate them or recover the bodies. Additional slides are feared.

Lot one of section 32, all of section 21, lots one, two and three, and north east quarter of south east quarter, north east quarter and north half of north west quarter section 29, south half and north east quarter, of south quarter, and south half of n w ¼, and e ½ of n e ¼, of section 20, e ½ of s e ¼ of section 17, s ½ and the n e ¼ of s e ¼ of section 16, w ½ of section 15, all in township twenty seven, south of range 13 west containing 3717, acres more or less which lands are subject to overflow by tide water and by freshets, and are situated in the County of Coos, and state of Oregon.
