Council Proceedings.

(Regular Monthly Session.) The regular session of the Common Council was held on the evening of the 4th inst.

Present all the Councilmen except Mr. Haeker, who was a circuit court juror and Mayor Sherwood, also engaged in court.

Councilman G. W. White chairman of the council, presided.

The monthly reports of the City Recorder, Marshal and Treasurer, were presented, read and referred to the finance committee.

The finance committee reported, the reports of the City Recorder, Marshal and Treasurer, for the months of January, February and March, correct and returned said reports to the city files.

Councilman Harlocker, from the committee on streets, reported that said committee were now expecting piles for wharf repairing, to be delivered most any day, and the wharf put once more "in a business attitude."

Councilmen Stanley and White were appointed a special committee to prepare books, and warrants for the purpose of keeping all accounts, appertaining to the water works system, indebtedness and payments of the same.

Council session was favored with the presence of Mr. E. W. Guptill of Coos river.

Myrtle Point Enterprise.

B. F. Hill and wife who have been in Ashland for some time, have returned to their home at Bridge.

Steve Minard and Bert Folsom have started a logging camp on the East Fork and expect to put in a large number of logs. They are also operating the Minard saw mill at Dora.

Chas Morris, a resident of Rural, on the South Fork, dropped dead Monday afternoon while walking in his yard, heart failure being the cause of death. Mr Morris was a pioneer resident of this county, having come to the Coquille Valley in 1855. The deceased was born in Wayne county, Missouri, and moved from there to California in 1854, where he remained until coming to Oregon. He was 74 years of age at the time of his death and had been in failing health for some time. Besides other relatives, he leaves a wife and six children—four sons and two daughters. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Secrist, Wednesday, and the remains laid to rest on the home place.

We were struck the other day on reading comment on an old ternaunt of a woman who had departed, leaving behind "A good woman gone." The same generous quality displays itself in the comment on the demise of a man.
