## HERMANN AHEAD!

## Light Vote in Coos County Returns From Largest Precincts.

The latest estimates from the outside are that Hermann will be elected by 3500 majority.

We are informed that the Decoration services at Myrtle Point were well conducted last Saturday. There was a good turnout and the decorative services at the cemetery by the G. A. R. Post was a very impressive affair, and took place in the forepart of the day. The floral offering was complete and profuse, as beautiful flowers were lovingly distributed, every grave being remembered, and the monument to the "unknown dead" was showered with nature's most lovely floral offerings. At two o'clock p. m. Hermann's opera hall was packed with people, gathered to listen to the program by the young people and an address by Professor Hoadley D. D., which proved to be a masterly effort. Lincoln's Gettysburg address was read, and a historical address regarding that great battle by Orvil Dodge added interest. It is said that the people of our sister town have reason to feel proud of the good management of the exercises of that sacred and important day.

It has been said that parties with plenty of capital, were at Roseburg during the winter just passed, who wanted a location for a fruit, vegetable and fish cannery, but the wagon road was in such bad condition, they deferred a visit to Coos county, to some future time. The Herald believes that the county has all the requisites for such an enterprise. Sweet corn, peas and other vegetables grow prolific, and fruits are abundant, and our river has proved its ability to supply tons of fresh fruit of superior quality. There is room for three or four plants of the kind. One at Myrtle Point, one at Coquille City, one at Riverton, and another at Bandon. Our shipping facilities by water reaches to every port in the world, hence there is no better place in the United States for such an enterprise.

The creameries all along the river and valley are running full blast, and the indications are favorable for a larger shipment of their product this year than heretofore. There are four butter and cheese factories within a radius of five miles of Myrtle Point. These creameries will distribute over a hundred thousand dollars among the farmers this year, besides the many creameries below Arago, and the other dairies using separators will double the income to the farmers. The grasses are prolific, having a healthy growth everywhere, thus assuring a good season. There is a dozen or more good locations for creameries in this county, and when they are all located, it will form a grand source of wealth for the farmers.
