Conflict About Played Out.

The contest between employers, that has been an industrial drag upon the progress of this city for several weeks, is apparently about over, in consequence of weariness on both sides with little if any advantage or profit to either side or any party. Most of the laundries have resumed operations, with both union and nonunion labor. The lumber mills, alleged to have been operated as a trust, are selling lumber, it is reported, freely to all persons, without discrimination. Work on most buildings is going ahead and the prospect is fairer than it has been heretofore this year for increased, uninterrupted and continuous activity in the building trades.

It were useless to philosophize more than has been done on the prolonged differences and difficulties in the local labor field, further than to say that probably there have been mistakes, and too much obstinacy on both sides, and that some of the movements made have been ill-advised. Labor unions should have realized that they cannot absolutely and arbitrarily dictate terms to employers, nor entirely employment of nonunion men; and employers should have learned, if they have not, that it is not profitable to take an arbitrary and defiant stand against unions, asking for what they consider reasonable and right, in view of increased cost of living and the progress of the labor world toward easier conditions and a more intelligent comprehension of affairs.

The delays, inconveniences and losses that have been suffered on both sides, while not as great as in some other cities, should serve as a useful lesson, the learning of which is yet far from thorough or complete; to wit, that in all such cases reason, moderation, tolerance and a spirit of the Golden Rule should govern men's actions, and that concession, conciliation and arbitration should be substituted, in almost all cases, for strikes and lockouts.—Portland Evening Telegram.

The thirty-first annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association, will be held in the Exposition Building, Portland, Oregon, Wednesday, June 17, 1903. All persons coming to, or born in, the original Territory of Oregon prior to February 14, 1859, without regard to where they now live, are eligible to membership. At the close of the program the Pioneer Woman's Auxiliary will give a banquet to all members of the Association in good standing, who have the proper badge for 1903. Special invitations will be issued to the husbands or wives of pioneers who may not be pioneers themselves, upon application to Mr. Himes, All Pioneers, Indian War Veterans and Native Sons, and Native Daughters, paying full fare to Portland over any of the Southern Pacific lines, who take a certificate showing that properly countersigned, and this must be by the secretary of each organization. Be sure to get a certificate when you get your ticket at starting point. The O. R. & N. Co. will grant the same rate (one and a third fare), on all its rail lines, providing there is a total attendance of fifty, tickets to be purchased at starting point, not more than three days before June 17th. Get certificate at starting point that you have paid full fare, and present same to secretary of each organization. This will secure return fare at one-third if presented not later than June 19.

We may excusably grumble a little about our cool and sour May weather, especially when we want to show Oregon off to good advantage to the President, but when we consider Montana we may yet be contented and even happy in comparison. For three days a terrible winter blizzard has raged in that state, destroying stock to the value of \$5,000,000. Poor Montana! Fortune Oregon!—Telegram.

Manila, May 20.—Two thousand native houses have been destroyed by fire in the Tondo district of Manila. About 8000 persons are homeless, and are being fed and sheltered by the municipality. The damage is estimated at 2,000,000 pesos.

Defacing Nature's Wonders.

Others' protests availed not, but possibly the outspoken condemnation of the President will not be without reformatory influence. Reference is made in this remark to the vulgarism that delights to write or carve names or stick up cards in public places or on objects of interest, such as the great trees of the Yosemite, a wonderful cliff, or a marvelous natural palisade. When the President perceived a multitude of cards containing the names of visiting vulgarians fastened to the great sequoias, he vigorously condemned the practice, as many have done before, without avail; but possibly his voice will be more potent.

Akin to this vice, as the Sacramento Bee remarks, is that of advertisers "who mar the face of the country with huge signs, painted upon rocks or other natural objects setting forth the virtues of medicines, windmills, axle-grease, or other articles for sale;" and the Bee suggests as a punishment that each such advertiser, when detected, "should be compelled to take a dose of his own medicine."—Telegram.

Concerning the pronunciation of the name of the President of the United States, his uncle, Robert B. Roosevelt, writes to the New York Sun as follows:

"In English, when we try to distinguish the long from the short 'o' we get into trouble. In Dutch they do not. The double 'o' is simply a long 'o.' The word 'Roosevelt' is pronounced in the same way under all circumstances and in all combinations. So the first syllable of the President's name is 'Rose,' pure and simple. But the following 'e,' like the short German 'e,' or like the silent French 'e,' when read in poetry is slightly aspirated. An English analogy is the word 'the,' a word that our chairman must have come across in his 'reading and speech culture.' It is not pronounced at all as it is spelled, not like 'thee,' but with a sort of 'th' and a breath stopped by the tongue on the teeth. So the name is 'Rose-uh-velt.'—Oregonian.
