Mr. Swift served in the infantry from Iowa over four years during the Rebellion, and was in "Sherman's March to the Sea."

Decensed was buried at half-past two o'clock, Sunday in the Bandon cemetery, under the auspices of the G. A. R. Post of this place. He leaves a wife three daughters and two sons to mourn their sad loss.
