Coquille Celebrates in True American Style.

Although there was a slight mist made its appearance, and chiffon and laces became a little limp, and the beautiful emblematic colors of the bunting, which was very much in evidence, blended a little, the ardor of American patriotism was not so affected, and all went off very well. At the outset the boat from Myrtle Point, bringing the band Chas Howe, " " " " 11 25

for the occasion, failed to put in an appearance on time, but luckily the Margarita Fischer Co., was in town, and that band saw our dilemma and responded quickly, and patriotic strains were soon resounding through our streets.

The parade consisted of floats bearing Miss Emma Lorenz as the Goddess of Liberty, Miss Clara Sherwood as the Angel of Peace, Miss Sue Tuttle as Columbia, the Liberty Car, and Uncle Sam and the thirteen original states. Then came Mr. Vosmer and baloon, the P. F. & L. Co's. float with a full-fledged sawmill in operation, and then Coquille's Fire Brigade.

At the grove an interesting program was rendered. After prayer by Rev. Adolph Haberly, the reading of the Declaration of Independence by Dr. J. W. Strange, of Myrtle Point, Rev. W. S. Holcomb delivered a splendid oration, and the Coquille City Glee Club and the Fischer band furnished delightful music.

Then came the ball game between the Marshfield and Coquille teams, the visitors carrying away the honors.

Immediately after the base ball game came the balloon ascension by the Vosmer Bros., of Oakland, Cal., which was a perfect success, and the first ever attempted in Coos county. It was feared that the weather would not be suitable but the clouds lifted high enough not to interfere, and offered a background to the view which was perfect. At a given signal Mr. Vosmer cut loose his parachute and made a beautiful and safe descent, coming down about two miles above town in the marsh back of J. C. Laird's place.

The days sports wound up with a ball in the evening which was an enjoyable affair for those who attended the sport.

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Death of C. W. Paterson.
 C. W. Paterson, a worthy citizen and prominent business man of this city, died at his home in West Marshfield yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock. He was conscious up to the last hour and his passing away was peaceful. His beloved wife, two sons and tender relatives who had watched over him and administered to his every want, were at his bedside when the final summons came.

Deceased was born at Ingersoll, Canada, April 25, 1854, and was a marble cutter and masonry architect by trade, which profession he was following in this city at the time of his first illness, which occurred over a year ago. He had made two trips to San Francisco in search of medical aid but without relief.

Deceased made his advent in Marshfield in 1888 and in January, 1901, took upon himself a wife, Miss Ida Hall. Two sons were the fruits of their union, who with his beloved wife are left to mourn his loss. Deceased was chief of the Marshfield Fire Department and always took a prominent part in public affairs. He was a member of Coos Bay Camp, No. 106, W. of W., and was a hard worker for the up-building of the order.

His death has cast a gloom over many sorrowing friends, and is a hard blow to his devoted wife and beloved sons, who have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community in their hour of grief.—Sun.
