

Trust Stocks Weakening.

Mr. J. P. Morgan is reported as being worried over the persistence of what has been termed the "rich men's panic," of the lack of confidence in some if not all the "Morganeered" enterprises or speculations.

The Philadelphia North American remarks that "the Morgan trusts and other concerns similarly organized are in a condition analogous to that of a county which has issued paper money far in excess of its ability to redeem and which has no intention to make its paper good."

But there is no apparent danger of such a "panic," or period of extreme industrial depression, as occurred ten years ago.

Oregonian News Bureau, Washington, July 11.—A wild rumor was set afloat in Washington today to the effect that extensive pension frauds had been unearthed in Oregon.

Commissioner Ware today said he had assigned Terry to Oregon because his health was poor, and he needed a change of air.

The department is convinced that pension attorneys are bleeding Oregon veterans, as they are veterans of other states but Mr. Terry's visit has no connection with such irregularities.
