Quarantine on Humboldt County Calves Modified.

Owing to the prevalence of an infectious disease known as "among the calves of Humboldt county, it became the duty of the State Veterinarian to restrict their shipment to other parts of the state, and on March 30th of this year Governor Pardee issued a proclamation prohibiting the shipment of all Humboldt county calves under twelve months old.

This action resulted in arousing the stockmen of that county and at a mass meeting held in Ferndale on May 6th to consult with State Veterinarian Blemer, a permanent organization known as the Humboldt County Live Stock Association was affected and a county ordinance providing for the appointment of an inspector to improve the live stock sanitary conditions, and looking to the eradication of infectious diseases was suggested for adoption by the Board of Supervisors.

Amendment to Quarantine Proclamation of March 30, 1903, Modifying the Quarantine on the Calves of Humboldt County, California. Executive Department, State of California.

Sacramento, June 16 1903.

Whereas: The Hon. Board of Supervisors of the county of Humboldt, state of California, have enacted a county law or ordinance, known as Ordinance No. 81, "An ordinance to suppress, eradicate, and prevent the spread of infectious or contagious diseases among live stock in the county of Humboldt, and providing for the proper enforcement of its provision."

Therefore, the proclamation of March 30, 1903, is hereby modified in accordance with the following rules and regulations.

All calves originating in the county of Humboldt, over five (5) months, and less than twelve (12) months of age, may be moved to points in the state of California, upon inspection and certification that they are free from any infectious or contagious diseases, by a duly authorized officer of the County Board of Supervisors.

Copies of all certificates of inspection made under this modification, must be forwarded to the State Veterinarian of California before or at the time that said shipment is made, giving full information as to the origin, destination and consignors of said shipment.

This amendment is granted upon conditions that the Board of Supervisors of said county enforce efficient measures, looking to the live stock sanitation, and the eradication of any infectious or contagious diseases. In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of this state to be hereunto affixed, this 16th day of June, 1903.
